NEWS NOTES OF THE GREAT NORTHWEST

(United Press.)
EUGENE, Or., Oct. 30.—Another effect of the war will be to raise the position in life of the meek and lowly West Coast clam.
Dr. C. H. Edmondson of the zoology department of the University of Oregon, today came to the aid of the uncomplaining bivalve with the statement that it is in the same class with the aristocratic oyster as far as palatability and food value are concerned.
Dr. Edmondson, who spent several weeks on the Coast studying shellfish, said today there are seven varieties of edible clams along the shore of Washington and Oregon. Edmondson and other Coast scientists are now engaged in the intensive study of clams, in order to help intelligently in cultivating them. Within the last few years, razor clams, a particularly desirable variety, have been growing scarce.
SEATTLE, Wash. Oct. 30.—A special meeting of the Pacific Coast Hockey Association opened here today to discuss the prospects of a hockey league in Washington, British Columbia and Oregon this year.
Today's session is preliminary to the annual meeting which will be held in Vancouver next month when schedules will be arranged and definite plans made.
CAMP LEWIS, TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 30.—Men from the Regular Army, the National Guard and the new National Army here today are filing applications for admission to the Officers' Training camp which will open here January 5, 1918.
Six hundred men will be put through an intensive course of training and given commissions for the new National Army.
The National Army is short of commissioned men. This shortage is particularly noticeable here. Some companies of 250 men have only one second lieutenant to command them.
PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 30.—Pacific Northwest soap manufacturers are being forced out of business because they are unable to buy cans in which to market their products while the average housewife throws away valuable baking powder and baking tins, soap makers claim here today. They are organizing a movement to prevent waste of old cans.
PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 30.—Good-by frills. So long belts and cuffs. Men's clothing is to be simpler—must be plainer to save cloth and wool. This today is the claim of Portland tailors.
The demand for uniforms has reduced the amount of material available for civilian use. Elimination of waste and unnecessary adornments must follow.
DILLON, Mont., Oct. 30.—Fifteen pairs of black foxes—valued at \$5000 a pair—are expected to arrive here any day now from Prince Edward Island in Eastern Canada. John Hohme is to be proprietor of Montana's

strangest venture—a fox farm.
A tract of land 15 miles from here has been prepared for the fox. A fence under which the animals cannot dig or even which they cannot jump has been erected. It cost \$20,000.
Hohme, backed by Butte capitalists, expects to reap a big profit from raising the animals.
