UNION COUNTY AT THE STATE FAIR

Union County horses and ponies were a large factor in the horse division of the State Fair. In fact the show made by actual breeders of horses did not amount to very much aside from Union County entries, and it is the entries made by actual breeders of livestock that will give one some idea of the class of livestock actually being produced within a given territory. Great barns filled with horses brought in to the state to be sold is no indication of what the state is actually producing, though if all these animals were sold within the state they would naturally tend to improve the class of livestock we are producing. But it was exhibits such as came from Union County that were a fair index as to what this state actually can and does produce. There were a total of 27 horses, 30 ponies, 20 head of hogs, and 6 head of cattle at the State Fair that were entered from Union County. The cattle and hogs being a new factor from this county. Heretofore horses being the only entries. The 6 head of Brown Swiss cattle belonging to Ed Meyersick, and the 20 head of Chester White hogs belonging to Arch Conley, made a very creditable display. The horses, cattle, and hogs won the following premiums:

First on get of sire, senior champion stallion two times, senior champion mare two times, grand champion stallion two times, grand champion mare two times, junior champion bull once, 15 first prizes, 7 second prizes, 5 third prizes, 6 fourth prizes, and 2 fifth prize. While the Levy ponies won senior champion stallion, junior champion stallion, senior champion mare, junior champion mare, grand champion stallion, 16 first prizes, 2 second prizes, and 2 third prizes. The premiums won by our stock being against the best of its class in the state, we have every reason to be proud of the results as the State Fair had the highest quality of the exhibits throughout that it has ever had.

In the way of other products Sam Williamson, of La Grande, won first prize on his half bushel of bluestem wheat in the cereal show, and T. B. Mulholland second prize on his half bushel of red chaff club.

In the county exhibits Union County secured second place for the Eastern Oregon division, being outscored by Baker County by a quarter of a point. Wasco County, that won first place last year and outscored Union County by a half point, only receiving fourth place this year. The county exhibits this year being far much better than a year ago.

In the boys' and girls' industrial club work it will be interesting to note that Earl Dial won fourth prize in the corn growing contest, fourth prize in the potato growing contest, and fifth prize on garden growing contest of the state. While D. Smutz would have been a close contender with the best of any in the corn growing contest had he made his entries in time. However, due to being late in making his entry his corn was disqualified.

It might be of interest to the people of this county that this county had by odds the best representation in the number of various entries of any county in the state that had to come as far as we did.

Ed Meyersick had no competition against his Brown Swiss Cattle. Arch Conley made a particularly strong showing at this fair, and received a good many first prizes. With the same hogs at the State Fair he did not fare quite so well due to difference of opinion of judges, as he had to compete against a good many hogs at the State Fair that he had competed against at North Yakima.
