It is thought however that about four carloads can be turned into cider and vinegar. The loss will be very heavy however, as apples for cider and vinegar only bring one third the present price of apples for the market.

Eck of The Dalles Lutheran church will arrive tonight on train No. 18 and will hold services in the Lutheran church tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock, and Sunday school at 10 o'clock. Rev. Dr. Dora Underwood Appointed—Dr. Dora Underwood received word today from the Women's National Medical Association that she had been appointed chairman of one of the committees of Oregon women physicians in the interest of women's hospitals. The war service committee of the Medical Women's National Association has organized the American Women's Hospitals for work at home and abroad. The surgeon general of the Army and the general director of the Department of Military Relief of the American Red Cross have approved the provision made for service to the Army and to the civil population. The work will be officially part of the medical and surgical service of the American Red Cross Association. The scope of the plan is a broad one. It includes units for maternity service and village practice in devastated parts of the allies' countries and hospitals run by women for service there as well as for the United States Army in Europe. In this country acute convalescent cases will be treated in hospitals equipped for the purpose; soldiers' dependents will be cared for; interned alien enemies will be given medical aid and substitutes will be provided to look after the hospital service and the private practice of physicians who have gone to the front. The first units hope to go to France and to Serbia this fall.

Conversion of Old Newspapers and Candles Into Fuel—Spread out four newspapers, eight sheets in all, and begin rolling at the long edge. Roll as tightly as possible until the papers are half rolled, then fold back the first three sheets toward the rolled part and continue to wrap around the roll almost to the first fold, then fold back another three sheets and continue to wrap around the roll again up to the last margin of the paper. On this margin, consisting of two sheets, spread a little glue or paste and continue the rolling, so as to make a compact roll of paper almost like a torch. If six of the sheets are not turned under, there will be too many edges to glue. While the newspapers may be cut along the line of the columns before rolling and the individual columns rolled separately, as is done in the making of the trench candles in France, it is easier to roll the whole newspaper into a long roll and then cut it into short lengths. A sharp carving knife, a pair of pruning shears or an old-fashioned hay-cutter will cut the rolls easily. These little rolls must then be boiled for four minutes in enough paraffin to cover them and then taken out and cooled, when they are ready to be put in bags and sent to the front. If there are more newspapers than candle ends, block paraffin can be bought for a few cents at any grocery or drug store. Little children and grown-ups in Italy and France are rolling, gluing, and paraffining these ration heaters by the millions, and their fathers and husbands in the high Alps and other places where wood and coal cannot be sent are cooking their rations over them.
