Dr. Koefel says, "The only safe way to smoke a cigarette is to hold it between the fingers all the time, take a puff when desired, and blow it out speedily."

SPEAKER CLARK PREDICTS GREATER PROFITS TAXES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—"Raising money." That is Speaker Clark's terse answer to the question: "What will be the chief work at the next session of congress." However, he said, "I think we will not raise as much as we did last session, \$21,000,000,000. The ships we paid for, the aircraft we authorized, and a lot of the guns and military material we bought, won't have to be duplicated. But there'll be enough to raise to keep us busy. I think we'll have about a fifty-fifty split on taxes and bonds." This will necessitate greater profits taxes. The present ratio is about sixty-five—thirty-five, with bonds on the long end.

CANADIAN BOOTLEGER HAS HARD ROW TO HOE

NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C., Nov. 3.—Pity the Canadian bootlegger.

Those who have seen the workings of the prohibition laws in Oregon, Washington and Idaho as compared with the new British Columbia city law say that the Canadians are much more strict and convictions more often secured here than in the states.

A recent case here illustrates this point. Toy Wing, a Chinaman, was convicted of selling liquor. He received six months of hard labor.

The offender here, even on his first conviction, gets a jail sentence while in the states he would probably receive only a fine or a suspended sentence at the most.

CAMP LEWIS WILL HAVE ROUND-UP OF ITS OWN

CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 3.—Let 'er buck.

Borrowing their slogan from the famous Round-up of Pendleton, Ore., cowboys in the 348th regiment of field artillery—composed principally of men from Montana, Idaho, Wyoming and Utah—today are completing plans for a rodeo.

They say it will offer more thrills than the Pendleton show. The affair will be staged about November 10—one week from today.

Bulldogging, fancy roping, trick riding, contest riding, wild horse racing, steer riding and broncho busting are on the tentative program. Major General Green is taking a personal interest in the affair and has ordered that the men can use all of the horses in the remount station.

Captain C. M. Breezer is responsible for the idea and J. L. Lingley is manager. The regiment includes a number of men widely known in the cattle country.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC CHANGES SCHEDULE

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 3.—

Changes in the Southern Pacific passenger schedule, including the addition of another Portland-San Francisco train.

The new train, known as No. 53, will leave Portland at 1 a. m. and will arrive at San Francisco 10:50 p. m. the following day. Changes in the schedule of the Shasta limited are also made.

The removal of the big coast liners, Great Northern and Northern Pacific, has so increased traffic over the Southern Pacific the new trains were made necessary.

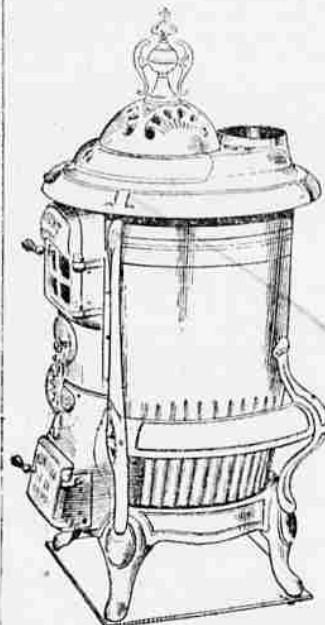
