NEWS NOTES OF THE GREAT NORTHWEST

Red Cross Men in Portland.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 3.—Chairman Henry P. Davidson and General Manager Harvey D. Gibson, of the American Red Cross, arrived in Portland yesterday and during the course of the day explained plans and purposes of the great organization which they direct.

Red Cross workers from various parts of Oregon met with Davidson and Gibson yesterday, disposing of local problems, planning new activities and exchanging ideas. Last night the national heads of the Red Cross and Rev. Robert Davis, of Englewood, N. J., who has just returned from a visit to Europe, will speak at a Red Cross rally at a local theatre.

Teachers Pledge Help.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 3.—(Special.)—Every teacher of Sherman county pledged help in getting the food economy pledge cards signed. The home demonstration agent, Miss Martha Bechen, made her appeal so strong that the unanimous decision was made at the teachers county institute.

Food Drive Success.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 3.—In complete returns from various parts of the northwest indicate today that Washington, Oregon and Idaho have responded to Hoover's pledge card drive with patriotic determination.

This is "clean-up" day in Washington. Pledge card distributors are hunting for homes in which the cards are not displayed—and there is mighty few of them.

Over 12,000 workers, it is estimated took part in the campaign in the three states.

War Gardens Bring Profit.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 3.—(Special.)—A big profit as well as increase in food materials was made from many war gardens planted in Oregon last spring. Baker has one. The 96 special gardens planted by girls and boys club members yielded crops worth an average of \$20 each, clearing \$12 each—a total profit to the city of \$768. This gain, says H. C. Seymour, who is now organizing the club work for next year is typical of that of the many communities that employed competent local leaders. A big gain not reported was obtained by assisting young people not club members and including many adults to go in strong.

O. A. C. Bulletin Gives Recipes.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 3.—(Special.)—"The Use of Dried Fruits and Vegetables," is a new O. A. C. bulletin that gives original as well as standard recipes for preparing the big stock of home and commercial dried food products now held in the Oregon homes and supply depots. Many of the dried products are so unusual that methods of preparation may not always be understood. 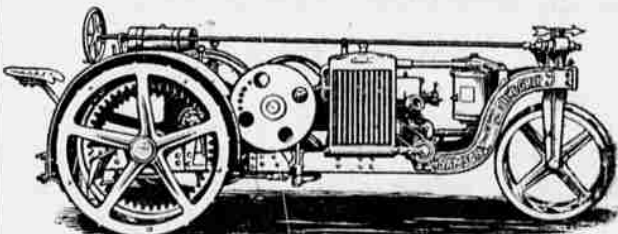
