COME THROUGH

DRAFTED MEN FROM UTAH AND WYOMING PASS THROUGH HERE

A troop train in two sections containing 329 recruits from Utah and Wyoming under Captain A. J. Mechim Quartermaster and Assistant Adj. General of Utah, passed through La Grande at 5:15 p. m. Sunday.

They were certainly a "Skookum" bunch of boys, and one of the jolliest and best behaved detachments that have gone through our city. A squad formed up on the platform and headed by two Standard bearers marched around the depot.

At Huntington and Baker the whole detachment marched through the town. The boys were cheerful and jolly notwithstanding the fact that they had been 48 hours on the train. The two sections were composed of Pullman sleeping cars under charge of Mr. Cole of the Pullman Co. of San Francisco who took charge at Salt Lake and will go through to Camp Lewis.

Both lunch meals and coffee is served in the dining cars. At Pocatello, Idaho, where the train was split into two sections, the citizens turned out and furnished the whole crowd with a hot meal, which the boys stated was "some feed."

Utah has had only 198 rejected out of their whole draft.

Most of the cars carried descriptions, such as "Berlin or Bust," "To H with the Kaiser, it is Wilson we are for." "Leave it to us we will protect you," "Hurray for America and the Star Spangle Banner", etc.

Many business men and a number of married men, some with their wives and children were in the draft. One man, an unnaturalized Frenchman, one of Utah's big sheep men, sold his whole flock at a loss of \$10,000.00 and joined, another was Salt Lake's largest Auto and Auto truck merchant.

At the last moment just as the train was pulling out of Salt Lake a young man with a wife and two small children received a personal telegram from President Wilson exempting him. He just had time to

throw his baggage off and yell goodbye to his boys as the train moved out of the station.

Utah's request to La Grande girls was handed out in the shape of a note written on the back of a lunch box and follows:

"Dear Girls of La Grande:—
"We are on the way to France to fight for you and to get old Kaiser Bill.

We request you to love and trust us while we are away. Don't marry any slackers or cripples while we are away. Wait for us.

RADIUM SUBMARINE DETECTOR

Denyer, Nov. 5.—Lieut. William R. Russell former chief of the wireless division of the Seventh N. Y. Infantry now in the reserve, has perfected what he believes is the solution of the submarine problem. The device consists of a small mica tube containing a radio-electric substance which projects electrical radiations and by reflected rays reveals a submarine. Lieut. Russell has submitted his invention to Washington authorities for a test.

MARINES TO GIVE BANQUET

Washington, Nov. 5.—A dish of beans, a "side order" of potatoes, and a cup of coffee served "a la trench,"—\$1.50.

That is the complete menu for a "banquet" to be given by United States Marines at their quantico, training camp, near here, during the first week of November. The "banquet" will be prepared on "rolling field kitchens," and the guests of officers, their wives and enlisted men, will dine from the "in mess-gear, used by Marines in the field.

Through this novel affair, the Marines expect to raise over \$10,000, and will turn the money over to an established war charity.

12,000 COAL MINERS WILL BE ON STRIKE TONIGHT
