keep it within Germany under a sentence of death if it steps as much as six inches over the German line."

The one compensation of this war, Mr. Marshall believes, is the fact that disproves the charge often made against the American people, that they are a money-mad race without courage. "This can never be said again," he continued, "for no nation has ever raised as many men or as much money in as short a time as the United States."

"It is my belief," said Mr. Marshall, "that this is a divinely made and a divinely kept government, destined to make the whole world free, whose cornerstone is not composed of written documents but consists of the Golden Rule 'Do unto others as you would have them do unto you.'"

"This war," concluded Mr. Marshall, "will never be settled for good by any mere treaty of peace. There must be some power to make peace. I hope to see a world tribunal. The only way for real peace is to have every person in the world represented in the government. The war had to come to work out the salvation of the world." Mr. and Mrs. Marshall left on No. 18 for Pendleton today.
