Captain Marker at American Lake—Captain A. R. Marker of La Grande was ordered to report to American Lake on the 12th of October and is now on duty there. He was first assigned to Fort Sill, Okla. He is now attached to the 316th ammunition supply train. He is in command of Caisson Company No. 1, which has 159 men, with a maximum strength of 189 men. This company will be equipped with 18 caissons, 1 spare cannon, 36 men. Three officers are to be mounted. The duty of the company will be to keep the artillery supplied with ammunition.

Here Enroll in Night School—The Commercial Class of the Y. M. C. A. High School Night School, was augmented by six new members last evening. Mr. F. A. Epling, the principal of the school, in talking with a reporter last evening said, that the commercial class was making rapid progress and in showing some of the work on the blackboard, he said that the work represents five weeks and was in advance by weeks of the regular commercial course work. Six applications have been made for the telegraphy class and it is very hopeful that the class will be started. The Western Union will have full charge of the class.

The General Store Merchant: More prompt and courteous treatment is likely to be accorded his orders and correspondence with the City jobber and manufacturer if his letters are typewritten.

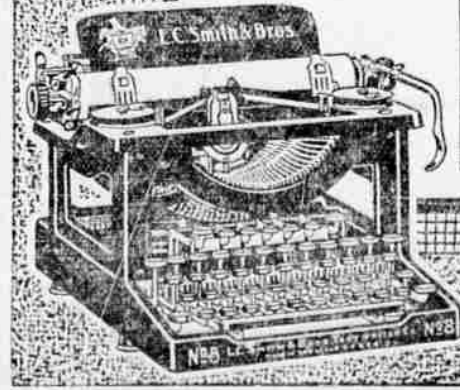
