And some day when you want to give something a little more substantial send along a Vest Pocket KODAK and ask your Soldier Boy to send pictures to you.

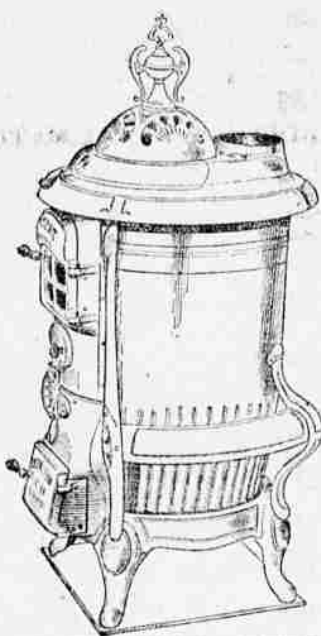
