Winner of O. A. C. W. S. C. Game Will Be N. W. Champion.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 16.—The winner of the game here this afternoon between the Oregon Agricultural College and the Washington State College will have undisputed possession of the Northwest title.

Although the Oregon Aggies will be working on their home ground with the grandstands packed with supporters, Washington State is confident of victory, according to the Pullman fans who arrived here today for the game. Coach Dietz' team—with an ambition to go through the season without a defeat—has a fine start toward that goal. Washington State is declared to be 50 per cent stronger this year than last and then the Washingtonians defeated Corvallis.

The Oregon Aggies have been drilling daily for a week for the game today, however, and will fight to a finish.

"With the co-operation of America, this object should be quickly attained. This will be the quickest means of putting a stop to German raids in France and England. It will also do more than anything else to shake the morals of the German nation and hasten the end of the war."
