O-W. Employees Buy Bonds—Employees of the O-W. R. R. & N. subscribed for \$2,140,150.00 worth of the second issue of Liberty Bonds. The company subscription was \$975,000.

Mrs. White to See Husband Off—Mrs. George A. White, wife of Adjutant General White, and her two daughters, passed through La Grande Friday night, en route to an Atlantic port, where they will say good-bye and goodspeed to the General, who is to sail on an unnamed date for the battlefield in France.

Car Loadings Increased—A recent statement of President Farrell, of the O-W. R. R. & N., is to the effect that the loadings of lumber which is one of the principal commodities handled by the road show an increase of 11-4 per cent over the same period for 1916. Miscellaneous products show an increase of 15 per cent for the same period while an increase of eight miles per car per day on all cars handled has been made.

Potato Crop Hard to Handle—One of the problems confronting the railroads is the handling of the potato crop, which is unusually large. According to President Farrell, of the O-W. R. R. & N., the crop is the largest in the history of the country. It is estimated that it will approximate 453,000,000 bushels. Even with intensive loading over 15,000 cars will be needed to transport the product.

Refrigerator Cars in Demand—To expedite the handling of the apple crop, box cars are being used as well as refrigerator cars. Growers in all the different sections of the Northwest are ready to forward at the same time, and the demand for refrigerator cars cannot be met. Shipments to localities where low temperatures are required, are protected with staves. Some shipments are sent to destination without other precaution than careful loading.

The match was preceded by three preliminaries and a musical program by a 12-piece orchestra which rendered several pleasing selections.

The feature of the performance being the showing put up by the local wrestler against a recognized professional. Pat, although not trained or conditioned, easily held his own and Webber had no advantage when time was called.

Francis and Jean Krause entertained the crowd with a "fly weight" match. The boys were about evenly matched but Jean took the fall in 3 1-2 minutes.

Dick Roberts and Oscar Johnson put on a clever and fast match that ended in a draw at the end of five minutes. In their second appearance Roberts got a fall at the end of four minutes.

Ad Satel will wrestle Jim Noregaard at Enterprise Friday night. He agrees to throw Noregaard four times in an hour.

On Saturday night he will wrestle in Elgin with John Berg. This will be a finish match. John Berg is now on his way here from Houston, Tex. He and his wrestling manager Webber today went to Hot Lake.

Joint Campaign Arranged

Union county's quota is \$5,990, but as in Portland, the local Y. M. C. A. maintenance campaign is to be operated jointly with the other and \$2,990 must be raised for local purposes in addition to the \$5,990.
