### CAMP LEWIS NOTES.

(United Press.)  
CAMP LEWIS, TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 12.—Sprung up as if by magic is the big base hospital here. Ninety-two days ago surveyors broke ground for the hospital. Today it stands, a group of 10 buildings, capable of housing 1000 sick men. Operating rooms are complete in equipment as any in the country, special apparatus for the treatment of practically all known diseases and doctors and nurses and surgeons make the hospital the equal of any on the Coast. An average of 10 operations are performed daily on the hospital. Over 800 men are in the hospital today receiving treatment. In addition to physicians and orderlies, 180 Red Cross nurses are stationed here. A number of the agents of mercy arrived this week.
