She would have liked dearly to have brought a set of initialed towels or a really pretty runner, but it was out of the question. After all, linen showers are more or less elastic things; so she finally decided to buy eight yards of cheesecloth at 5 cents a yard. She cut this into two-yard strips and folded each into a yard square of double thickness. Then she blanket-stitched each with a different colored cotton to hold the edges together. Incidentally, she knew the color scheme of the engaged girl's new home and so there was a pink edge for one bedroom, a lavender for another, a blue for the dining room and a yellow for the living room, though nobody would say a word if the dusters—yes, that's what they were—were all the same color.

HERE IS NEW 'NEEDLECRAFT'

But the Needles That Are Employed Are Those That Are Obtained From the Pine Trees.

It's really a needlecraft because you use needles, but not the fine, shining steel needles of embroidery or the bone or amber of knitting and crochet, but the long, green needles of the pine trees, the longer the better.

One is reminded of Indian basketry as one blinks the sweet-smelling needles gathered from under pine trees into pliable ropes of many uses. As the needles vary in length, the binding must be a continuous process. The thickness of the rope decided upon, the needles are laid in a bunch until the correct rope thickness is reached, then they are tied with a light cord or strand of raffia, which winds round and round, and as one needle ends another is added. The rope may be shaped into a basket or mat as the winding goes on, and the attractive trinket further elaborated with embroidery of raffia after the whole is finished. The continuous rows of rope are held together either by sewing them with the cord or raffia run through a long-eyed needle or as each row is wrapped it can include the row just preceding.

PRETTY SCHOOL DRESS



To make a plaid dress in a new way and to make it attractive, spells success when the task is to outfit the schoolgirl. A dress made of dark blue serge and bound with silk brocade is as plain as the most austere taste could wish, but it escapes being commonplace by a very simple expedient. The sleeveless overdress has come to the rescue of the plain frocks in dark colors, wherein the girls at school are correctly clad.

The overdress is shown in many developments, one of the simplest and most practical appearing in the picture above. Beautiful Lugano Smallest of Italian Lakes and One of the Most Picturesque

Lugano is the smallest though not the least beautiful of the Italian lakes—as a matter of fact it is not entirely in Italy, as the Swiss frontier is crossed at Chiasso, yet, perhaps on account of its Italian sounding name, it is usually classed with Como and Maggiore, says the Christian Science Monitor. The lake is surrounded by wooded hills, which rise directly out of the clear water, and at all times of the year it is beautiful.

In early spring these tree-covered slopes take on a soft purplish bloom; all the outlines become blurred and velvety as the sun rises in every branch and twig, and there is a wonderfully peaceful impression given by these soft outlines against a serene blue sky. All along the lake, sides are tiny villages, built on the steepest possible slopes, the houses seeming to stick to the hillside wherever a niche can be hollowed out. There is no road directly around the lake, so the inhabitants prefer to go everywhere by water. Little steamers ply from the town of Lugano to Portofino, taking a zigzag course in order to call at the various villages on either side of the lake.

Of all the villages, perhaps the most beautiful is Morcote, which lies east of Lugano, with its dark cypress trees standing out on the hillside against the pure sky, but for sheer picturesque effect the village of Gandria must come first.

The houses appear to rise straight out of the water, piled, as it were, one on top of the other, quite haphazard. Many of them shine white in the bright sunlight with hard blue-black shadows where the projecting eaves cover them. The walls at the water's edge are festooned with flowers and creepers, clinging wherever they can find a foothold, while the water laps softly against dim shadows of boats tied up under dark archways.

Each little village forms a separate picture, having its own characteristics, while over all the mountain of San Salvatore stands like a sentry on guard.

Skim Milk Most Valuable When Used as Food.

From the United States Department of Agriculture. While skim milk is useful for animal feeding it will serve its best use as food for humans. By substituting grain, green feed, buttermilk and whey in animal feeding, much skim milk may be left for human use as a beverage, in cooking, condensing or for making cottage cheese. Only the surplus of this valuable human food should be fed to stock.

While skim milk is good for stock, the fact remains that its highest efficiency cannot be had through turning it into meat. Skim milk is used most economically in animal production when fed to hogs, yet it takes 20 pounds when fed alone to produce one pound of pork. The same quantity will make three pounds of cottage cheese. In addition, cottage cheese contains 1½ times as much protein and one-third as much energy as pork, so that the skim milk in the cheese form gives quite as much energy and 4½ times as much protein as it would if converted into ham or bacon.

Even at the highest prices recently paid for hogs, skim milk fed to them is worth not more than one cent a pound. Yet one cent a pound or approximately one cent a pint, is very cheap for any human food, and particularly for a food so high in nutritive value as skim milk.

KNITTING DURING CHURCH ENCOURAGED BY MINISTER.

(United Press.) DENVER, Colo., Nov. 12.—The Sunday morning sermon of Rev. L. B. Lonsaere, local Congregational minister, is now accompanied by the merry clicking of a hundred pairs of needles. Women of his congregation, unwilling to leave off their knitting of sleeveless sweaters and other comforts for the Sammies petitioned the pastor for permission to knit during services. He not only agreed, but assisted them to recruit members of the Sunday morning knitting class.

CHEMIST WANTS JOHN D. TO SAVE ON GAS BILLS.

(CLEVELAND, Nov. 12.—When H. W. Orendorf, Cleveland chemist, concocted a chemical which he says will make flivvering cheaper by prolonging the life of gasoline as well as that of the flivverist's pocketbook, he sent the first sample to John D. Rockefeller with the suggestion that John D. use it in his car and save on his gasoline bills.

Orendorf has not heard from John D. but he says the chemical is being used successfully in French airplane engines on the Western front.
