ORDNANCE MEN SENT TO TEXAS

University of Oregon Students Receive Special Instruction.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 13.—Fifty men who completed the ordnance course of the school of commerce of the University of Oregon are on their way to the Government arsenal at San Antonio, Texas.

The men received special instruction in work outlined by the war department. A new class is being organized now and will open a week from today. One hundred and fifty applications for admission were received, but, under war department restrictions, only 50 will be admitted.

WRECKED STEAMER TO FLOAT

Schooner Oakland Will Be Launched Latter Part of Month.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 13.—The schooner Oakland, wrecked on the Oregon coast near Nehalem, March 23, 1916, will be launched the latter part of this month, if present plans are carried out. The vessel was pulled across Nehalem spit, a distance of 1000 feet, repaired and arrangements are now being made to replace her in the water. She carried a cargo of lumber from Columbia river to San Pedro, Cal., when she went ashore.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13.—The President's mediation board, headed by Secretary of Labor Wilson, will render a decision in the coast telephone strike controversy tomorrow afternoon, it is announced. It is reported that the decision will not recognize the telephone operators union. The commissioners are expected to hold that the operators have a right, under the constitution, to form unions.
