BESSIE BARRISCALE STARS IN "WOODEN SHOES"

A \$35,000 Dutch village with its canals, windmills and quaint tiled roof houses was erected in California for "Wooden Shoes," the Triumphant.

The story is presented at the Star Theatre Thursday and Friday.

This bit of Holland consists of twenty-six buildings of two and three stories, built as substantially as though they were to be inhabited permanently. Seventy-five men were employed for fifteen weeks to construct the set, which required 10,000 feet of Oregon pine, 25,000 feet of California redwood, 1,000 brick and 18,000 square feet of plastered surface.
