Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of school district No. 1, Union county, State of Oregon, that a school meeting of said district will be held in the Central school building on the 24th day of November, 1917, from 2 o'clock p. m. to 7 o'clock p. m. to submit to the people the following question: "Shall the District School Board of School District No. 1, Union County, State of Oregon, sell the property owned by the district and situate on the corner of Fir and Jackson streets and described as lots No. 22, 23, 24, 25, and 26 in Block 23 of Predmore's addition to La Grande?" And to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.
