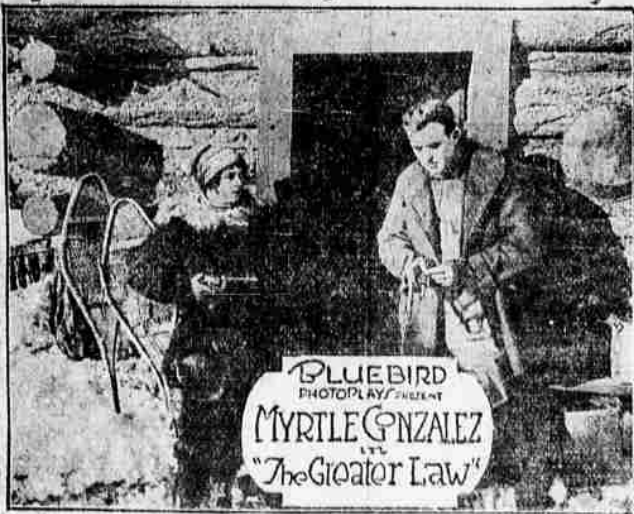

LONDON, Oct. 11.—(By Mail.)—With one stroke of his pen the Home Secretary has abolished a public nuisance and released a lot of lanky men for war work. He has prohibited whistling for taxicabs. In London one doesn't telephone for a taxicab. You pick them up as they pass. So the practice of whistling for them grew up. Every hotel and many private residences kept a whistle. 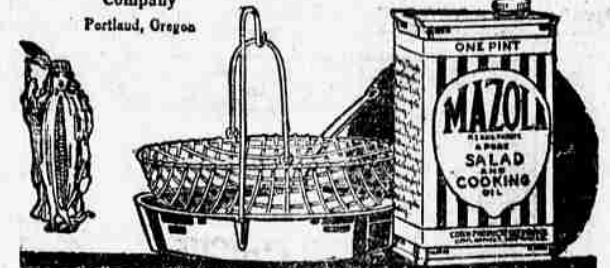
