Willard May Meet Fulton Next Spring

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—Jess Willard is getting ready to fight Fred Fulton—unless someone comes along and bumps Fred of the high perch he now occupies in the minds of fight fans.

Promoters are now angling for the match. One of them, in fact, has made a definite offer to Willard to meet the Minnesota mauler, only to have Willard answer that he wasn't ready to do any scrapping. Something definite, however, was pried from Willard, when he said he would be ready to fight soon and that he would let the people know when the time came.

Whether Willard's business of running a circus was responsible for his action in turning down the offer the heavyweight champion didn't say. It has been noised around—some say by Willard himself—that he wants to promote his own battle and take that much more coin away as his share of the proceeds. However, the promoter by whom the offer was made doubted whether Willard would bite off such a huge chunk, preferring to believe that Jess would hardly be able to devote any time to promoting if he was to take care of his circus business and prepare for a championship battle at the same time.

Jim Coffroth has angled for this fight without success. Willard has accused Coffroth of giving him a raw deal when Willard and Gunboat Smith met in a twenty-round murder in California while the world was still waiting for a successor to Jack Johnson. Smith did the murdering and Willard has been howling of late that he was robbed of the decision because of Coffroth. As a matter of fact Willard was lucky to escape without being completely knocked out, and should have little cause to grumble just because Coffroth wants to give him a few thousand dollars. To be real frank about it Coffroth probably has the only arena close enough to the United States where a bout of any class could be staged. Other scraps would have to be twenty-round affairs, where Willard probably would be able to hold off his opponent.

Fulton is going to get the match, though, and before another year has passed, unless Willard simply comes out and retires—in which case the title probably would be turned over to Fulton to defend. In that event a championship bout probably would be arranged immediately, for Fulton is the kind of a scrapper who doesn't sit back and wait for trouble. He goes and looks for it.

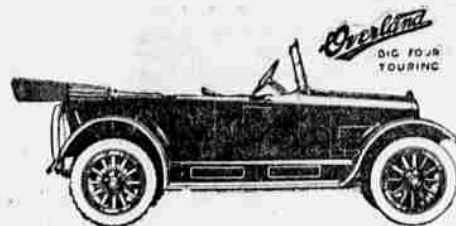
WILL BEGIN NEW BARRACKS.
