She must be ashamed of economizing or she would not refuse to hang up the card.

If women economized so strongly in their dress that they each purchased but one calico dress a year the money thus saved could not purchase one pound of beef, or fat, or wheat, or sugar if there were such a shortage that these foods were not on the market. It is well known that there is a shortage.

THE FORUM

To the Editor:—now that the Food Card Campaign is over in almost all parts of the state it is surprising to read the reasons given for not signing the card.

One would scarcely believe that there is so much ignorance among housewives. Ignorance is a disagreeable sounding word but it falls more agreeably upon the ear than disloyalty. It certainly is one of those two words that accounts for the refusals to help our government, when it may be so easily done.

It is wholly useless to excuse non-signers by saying, "They must have

be very quick to call upon the government to fulfill its promise to protect her if any of her rights were violated.

"I am not in this war," explains itself. If we are not for our government, we are against it.

It would be a wise thing to keep a record of non-signers, for in such times as these we want to know who stands squarely for the U. S. and who is secretly trying, in no matter how small a way, to hamper the government.

If mothers, who are rejoicing because their sixteen and seventeen-year old boys are not old enough to be drafted would think seriously for a moment, they would realize that everything that tends to prolong the war brings their boys nearer to the draft age. And, if the war lasts several years, boys will be drafted at a younger age than at present.
