To teach the children accuracy and honesty in business relations, no books will be lent children who owe fines. As a matter of courtesy, the library will allow adults to use a delinquent card once, but will hold the card at the library while the book is out. An improved dating stamp has also been obtained, which borrowers find more legible than the one formerly used. Every effort is made to be sure that new patrons of the library understand just how long the books may be kept.
