Mrs. Newton and daughter, Mazie, went to La Grande Tuesday.

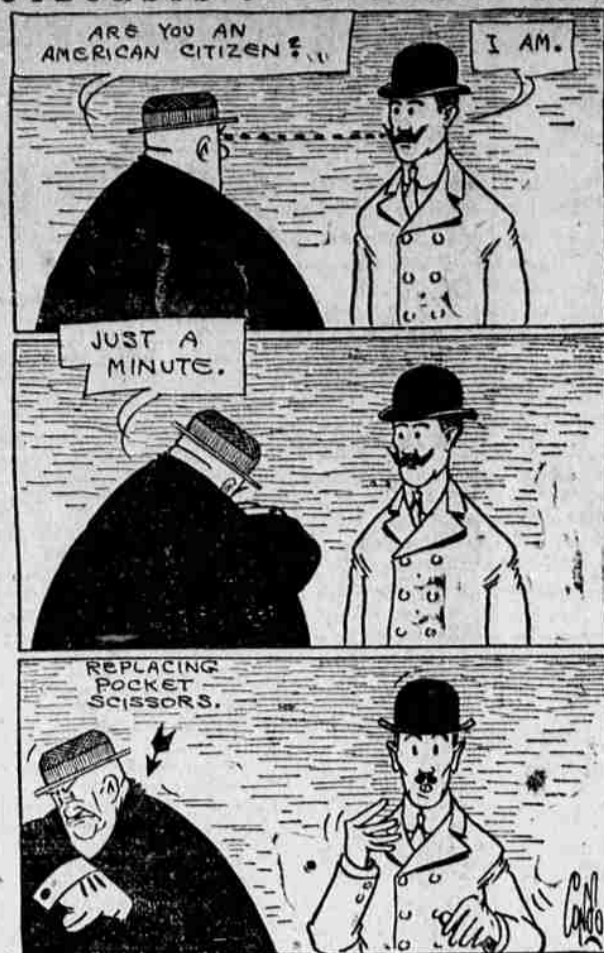
Mrs. Helms has moved into Hilgard from the ranch home, to be closer to school.

**Portland Livestock Show**

The Portland Livestock Show, as it is commonly called, is officially known as the Pacific International Livestock Exposition and is held each year at North Portland, Oregon, at the stockyards. This year it is being held from November 19 to 23. This show should be of particular interest to local stockmen, as they will not only get an opportunity to see the various classes of livestock as ordinarily shown at a stock show but they will also have an opportunity to study the market classes of livestock, entries having been made for the various classes of feeder and fat cattle, horses, hogs and sheep. They will also get a better conception of the workings of the stockyards at Portland and the latest methods of slaughtering and of the packinghouse operations, while there will be exceptionally good exhibition



of cattle, as there will be numerous exhibits from Oregon and Idaho that they will not see at local shows or at the State Fair. In connection with this stock show there are also held sales of the various classes of pure bred livestock. If you have never attended one of these shows, it will be well worth your while to make it a point to go this year.
