DODGE CAR CHOSEN

WAR DEPARTMENT FORMS FIRST MOTORIZED BATTERY.

WHOLE BRIGADE PLANNED

Dodge Selected for Arduous Service Because of Its Proved Record in Army Work During Mexican Border Experience.

The United States undoubtedly will have many completely motorized batteries before the war is over, but the honor of being the first in this country's service goes to Battery C, Fifth Field Artillery, United States Army. It was formed at Fort Sill, Okla., and is commanded by Captain W. H. Capron.

Captain Capron is a relative of Allen J. Capron, of Portland, and comes of a famous family of Captains who have been artillery commanders since the War of the Revolution.

A battery consists of four guns with their limbers, and six caissons with their limbers, six ammunition trucks, a store truck and a machine shop or repair truck. In the case of guns of smaller caliber a tractor will haul a section of artillery which consists of a caisson and its limber and a gun and its limber. Much shorter poles are used than with horses, the end of the pole being provided with a lunet or eye, making the coupling for the tractor. Each tractor pulls a load of about nine tons.

The vehicles used in the first motorized battery at Fort Sill are the six trucks, the Holt 45-horsepower caterpillar tractor and a Dodge Bros. touring car.

The entire motorized artillery brigade as proposed by the War Department will be composed of three regiments having a maximum strength of 3685 officers and men. It will have 72 guns and 108 caissons. To keep this equipment working will require 108 ammunition trucks, 27 store trucks, 90 tractors, 21 repair cars, nine passenger trucks, nine tank trucks and 37 supply trucks, all motor driven. In addition to these vehicles the brigade will have 297 motorcycles with side cars and 30 reel carts.

The adoption of universal motorized equipment is the acknowledged desire of military authorities. The fixed railroad track offers to the enemy an opportunity of delaying operations since it is only necessary to drop a few bombs to put transportation facilities out of commission. Roads are easier to repair and the use of motor trucks and touring cars of sturdy construction permits detours when necessary.

PARIS, Nov. 21.—The Germans attacked with violence over a two-thirds mile front north of Caurières Wood and made slight gains. It is stated. Immediate French counterattacks recaptured nearly all of the ground the enemy gained.

The work of motorizing field artillery is being pushed ahead in an aggressive manner by the Ordnance Department at Washington," says the Timken Magazine.

"The knowledge of the best-trained regular Army officers is being combined with that of automotive engineers of generally recognized standards. The engineering staff of the Ordnance Department is being supplemented, and for the time being at least the services of the men of first-class engineering ability and proper experience are being enlisted. 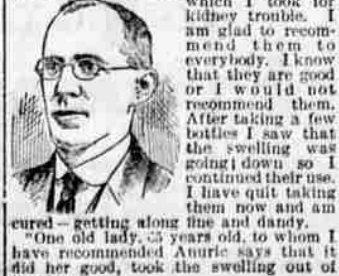
