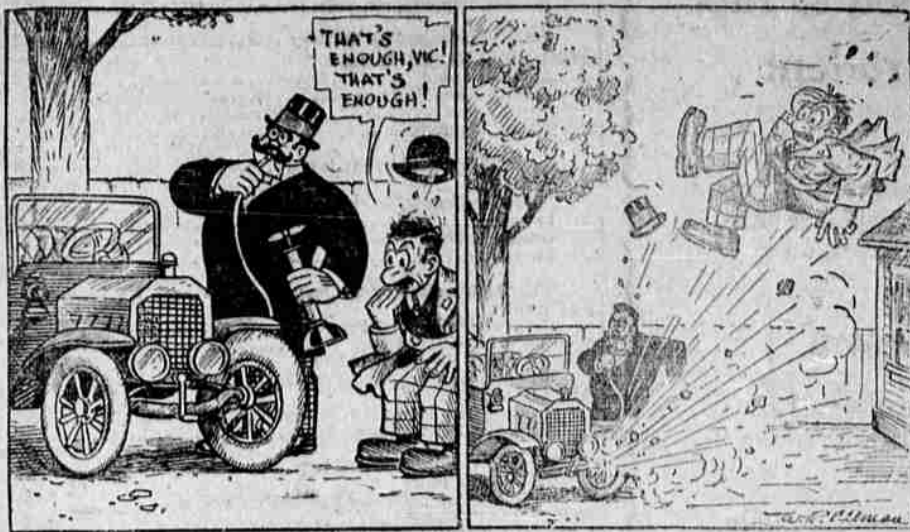
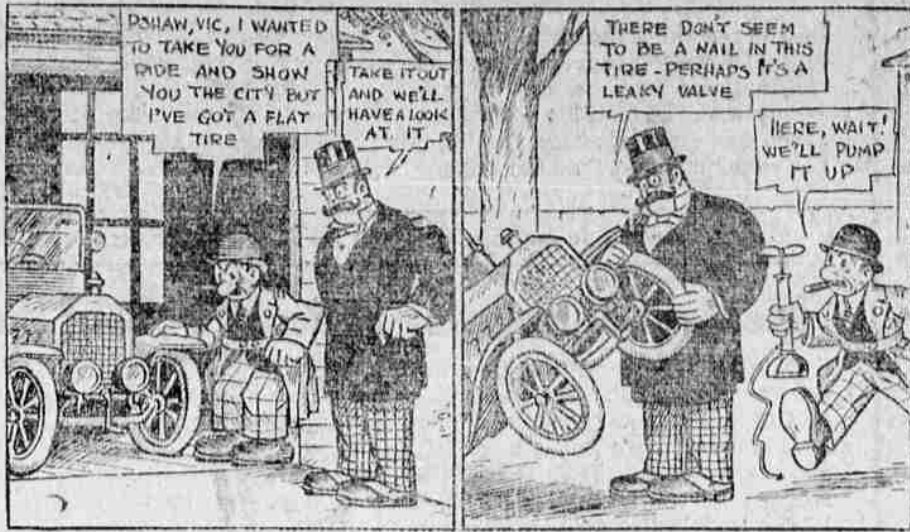

MOVIES TO HELP UNCLE SAM

Production of Airplane Spruce to be Stimulated By Pictures. (United Press.) PORTLAND, Nov. 22.—The movies will help Uncle Sam stimulate the production of airplane spruce. To show the stern necessity of getting more and more spruce out of Oregon and Washington forests, government representatives will travel from logging camp to logging camp with pictures showing the construction of airplanes and the nature of airplane fighting. When loggers, millmen and others in this important war work see the need for more spruce, the government feels it will have greater cooperation—and more spruce. Lumbermen here this week are organizing a patriotic society which will cooperate with the government in increasing the spruce output.

HOME CANNING METHOD O. K.

Expert Says Cold Pack Method is Safe to Use. WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Reports that there is danger of poisoning from vegetables preserved by the cold pack method have been placed in the category of enemy propaganda by Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the National Emergency Food Garden commission. "The cold pack method has been in use for five years and neither death nor serious illness has resulted from food canned according to directions," Pack said. "Home canned goods are safe and necessary."
