**City Manager's Report**

November 21, 1917.

To the Honorable Commission, City of La Grande, Oregon. Gentlemen—I hereby submit my reports for week ending November 20, 1917.

Fire chief reports two fires for week ending November 18, 1917. November 12, call came in from Box No. 25, corner Oak and Cherry streets, about 11:20 p. m. Fire was in a barn in which a treshing machine was stored. Property belonged to W. W. Randall; total loss; nine volunteers responded. November 13 a chicken house, belonging to Mr. Schroeder on North Ash street, caught fire. The adjoining property was saved, loss being confined to the small outbuilding. Ten volunteers responded. Origin of both fires unknown.

Chief of police reports no arrests for the week, but reports one entire circuit out on November 14, and on November 16 part of another circuit out.
