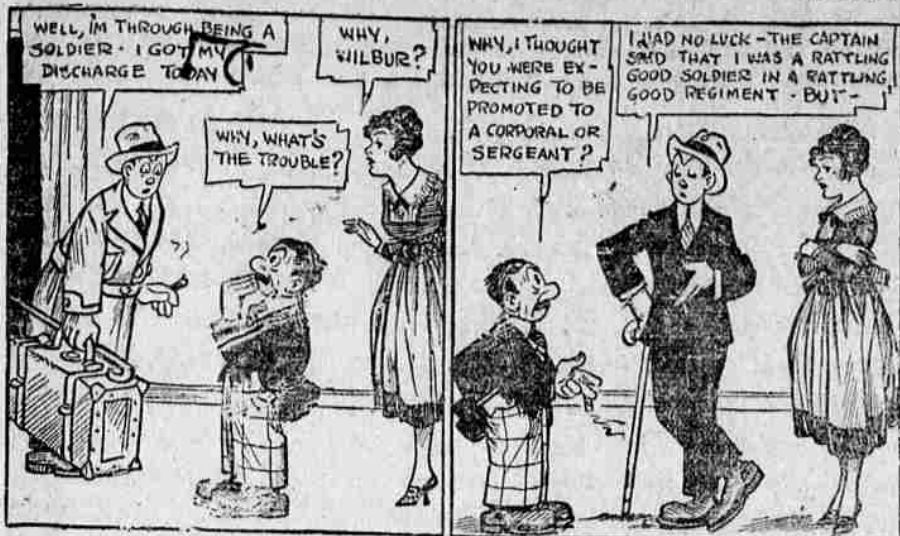

PRO-GERMAN ACTIVITIES TO BE SUPPRESSED

MADISON, Wis., Nov. 24.—(Special.)—One of the most despicable of the pro-German annoyances that has yet come to the notice of the state council of defense was recently reported from Fond du Lac. Some person or persons, representing themselves to be members of the staff of one of the local newspapers, sent a series of telephone messages throughout the city and rural districts to the effect that a transport on which Fond du Lac men were being conveyed to Europe had been sunk.

The newspaper thus unjustly implicated promptly offered a reward for information that would lead to the arrest and conviction of the offenders. The state council of defense stands ready and willing, with the powers delegated to it in chapter 82 of the laws of 1917, to back such prosecution to the fullest extent of the law.

This is on a par with the despicable rumor some one started in La Grande that the transport carrying the La Grande hospital unit had been sunk.

Marines Never Fail.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—"With the help of God and a few Marines I

shall carry out the department's instructions."

This terse message, variously accredited to every great naval commander from Paul Jones to George Dewey, finds a not unimportant place in the scheme of indoctrination of U. S. Marines at their training camps. That a U. S. Marine must never fail in anything he undertakes, that discipline, health, and courage are indispensable to his success as a Marine, and that the "advance always, and never surrender," idea be uppermost in his mind, night and day, are a few of the things in the creed of Uncle Sam's soldiers of the Navy.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS FOR TRAINING CAMPS

"Lights out!" blow the bugles. This is followed by a puffing and blowing to extinguish candles. An orderly in the camp subway merely throws a switch and every lamp in the camp goes out except the street lamps which are on another circuit. Our training camps, with an army in the making, are lighted with electricity. In some cases the drill field is also illuminated. Where the camps

are located away from any electric transmission line, and where it cannot be reached by any central station service, a small gasoline engine-driven generating plant is installed. The camp "aerata" are wired for street lights and the same poles carry the service wires from which the current is "tapped off" to light the barracks.

A typical installation is to be found at Camp Upton, situated on a government reservation comprising 16,000 acres, on the main line of the Long Island Railroad between the villages of Yaphank and Manorville. When entirely completed the camp will have from 15 miles to 20 miles of well paved streets, a modern sewerage system, a modern waterworks system, and an electric light and power distribution system.

The streets will be lighted by approximately 350 100-c. p., 6.6 amp. gas-filled tungsten lamps. There are five pumping stations, two for the waterworks system, aggregating 500 h. p. in capacity, and three for the sewerage system, aggregating 135 h. p. The refrigerating plant is also operated by electric motors in capacity approximating 135 h. p. Several hundred horse power capacity of motors of motors is also required for minor power purposes, and for heating.

It is estimated that the capacity for indoor lighting will be approximately 725 kw., for street lighting 50 kw., and as so far planned the complete installation will aggregate approximately a connected load of 1900 kw.

The distribution about the camp is 2300-volt, three-phase, on the main service avenues, with 2000-volt, single phase laterals through the streets. The secondary distribution is largely 110-220-volt three-wire system, only the terminal and lightly loaded ends being 110-volt, two wire system. A separate three-phase power circuit is run from the main transformer station to the refrigerating plant and sewage pumping plants.
