Notice: To All Grocers And Retailers Of Sugar

United States Food Administration Federal Food Administrator for Oregon—W. B. Ayer, 491 Northwestern Bank Building.

Portland, Oregon, Nov. 23, 1917. To All Grocers and Retailers of Sugar Effective November 22, 1917.

Dear Sir:—The following regulations are in effect throughout the State of Oregon:

Sales to family consumers are limited to 50 pound purchases.

Farmers living at a distance from purchasing points will be permitted to purchase in 25 pound lots.

Hotels and restaurants and boarding houses are limited to a ten day supply.

Sugar shall not be used as a leader for special sales or to encourage the sale of other merchandise.

In exceptional cases, where parties live at long distance from purchasing points, arrangements may be made through this office for sales in sack lots, when it is known that sales in lesser quantities will work hardships

on purchasers on account of the distance from the source of supply.

With reference to time between purchases, this office will not limit the purchases to any specific time, but each retailer is familiar with his customers' methods of purchasing and wherever he knows that a customer is buying in excess of his normal requirements, he is required to report same to this office, as under the new Food Administration Act, hoarding of any food commodities is not permissible, and every retailer must use due precaution in making sugar sales.
