LA GRANDE YARDMASTER IS VETERAN IN SERVICE

T. E. Buehler Holds Record with 24 Years at Same Job on Same Division.

T. E. Buehler, a resident of La Grande for over 24 years and yardmaster in the local yards for the same length of time, probably holds the record on the Union Pacific system for length of service as a yardmaster for continuous service on one division.

Yardmaster Buehler was born in Louisville, Ky., and started railroad-ing in East St. Louis, running a switch engine there for ten years for the B. & O. railroad. He then worked for the G. N. R. R. during the construction of that road between Spokane and Seattle, coming to La Grande in 1894 as yardmaster. At that time General Superintendent J. Buckley was chief dispatcher of the road on this division.

During Mr. Buehler's 24 years of service on this division the traffic of the road has enormously increased, the size of the engines and the size and number of cars hauled has been largely increased and incidentally his salary by successive increases, corresponding with the increase and importance of this division point has also gradually worked up until today he is receiving a little more than double the salary he started at in 1894.

CAMP LEWIS SOLDIERS WILL PRESENT PAGEANT

Epitome of Work of Soldier Will be Staged December 15-16.

CAMP LEWIS, TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 3.—An epitome of the work of a soldier will be staged here December 15 and 16. Tentative plans are completed today for the affair.

A combination military pageant and wild west show, the event promises to exceed by far any affair which yet has been staged by this camp.

Every military unit in camp will be represented. Approximately 35,000 men will take part. In a few hours a visitor will be able to get a better idea of the training that makes a soldier than a week spent in the camp.

Expert horsemen gathered from the cattle ranches of the west will give exhibition riding, roping and racing.

A great open air arena near the remount depot is being rushed to completion for the pageant. Race tracks, corals and a grand stand which will seat 15,000 persons are being laid out. All the eight regimental bands will be united in one band of 300 chime gun companies, wagon train companies, pack trains, engineering, signal, medical and other units will appear each day.

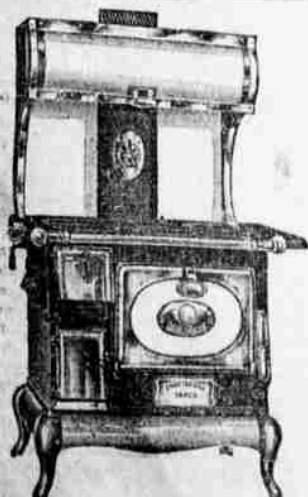
