

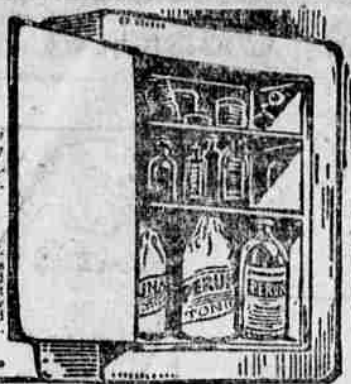

Goat Milk Good for Infants and Invalids—An interesting bulletin, No. 285, has recently been issued by the Agricultural Experiment Station, Berkeley, California, on "The Milk Goat in California." In referring to the uses of goat milk it says: "The most striking results so far secured relate to the feeding of goats' milk to infants. The station has had the opportunity of supplying this milk to a fairly large number of very young children who were in serious physical condition, due to their inability to properly digest and assimilate either modified cow's milk or any of the commercial infants' foods that were tried. In nearly all cases of this kind the physical condition of the children has been built up and satisfactory growth has been brought about by the use of goat milk." NORTHWEST

CAMP LEWIS, TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 8.—The regimental relay race, one of the big athletic events of the month, was run here this afternoon.

Teams of 25 men each, representing the 262nd, 363rd, 364th, 346th, and 348th field artillery and the machine gun battalions, started the race, which was run on the parade grounds. Each man will run half a mile.

The Y. M. C. A. will present a silver cup to the winning team.

PORTLAND, Dec. 8.—Methods to make shipyard work safer were discussed here today at a conference between shipbuilders and O. P. Hoff, labor commissioner.

Hoff recently completed a visit to most of the shipyards of the state in which he investigated the conditions under which shipbuilders worked. He declared today that he had found none of the shipyards have provided any sort of railing to keep men from falling from scaffolding around ship hulls. This, he considers, the greatest point of danger.

Commissioner Hoff held a conference with his deputies here yesterday in which shipyard labor conditions were discussed.

SALEM, Dec. 8.—The three-day session of the Oregon State Horticultural Society ended here today with a talk by George H. Himes, of Portland, on the methods of draining an orchard.

Thursday, the first day of the convention, was devoted to organization. Yesterday and today topics of interest to the orchardists were discussed.

PORTLAND, Dec. 8.—In the last 10 days 75 field glasses and telescopes have been presented to the navy by the patriotic people of the Pacific northwest, Captain E. F. Bekhardt, in charge of the local navy recruiting station, said today.

The greatly increased number of lookouts, scouts and shipguards on watch for submarines necessitated an unusually large number of glasses. The navy department gives each donor a receipt for his glass so that the instrument may be returned when the war is ended.

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 8.—The coast artillery team from the forts at the mouth of the Columbia river and the 91st division team from Camp Lewis, are playing a post-season football game here this afternoon.

PORTLAND, Dec. 8.—With a banquet at the Hotel Multnomah, the annual convention of the state hotelmen's association, will end here tonight. The convention opened here Thursday. Leading hotelmen from all the coast states attended.

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 8.—Although it has been in actual use for

a week, the new Camp Lewis officers' club, with clubrooms here, will not be formally opened until the middle of this month. Arrangements for the formal opening, the program of which will include a dance, are being made here today.

Membership to the club is limited to 500. As there are 2,100 officers at the camp, the waiting list is expected to be long. The club will establish a jitney line between Tacoma and the camp for the exclusive use of officers.

The club here offers members the use of a well-stocked library, dress-

ing rooms, free baths, information bureau, swimming pool, private club dining room and other things.
