PORTLAND LIVESTOCK MARKET LETTER

PORTLAND, Dec. 6.—General market conditions today are fair in all departments, with some show of strength in the cattle department.
CATTLE—Today's receipts show fairly well in the face of moderate demands. There were 600 heads on the market and prices ruled steady with yesterday's quotations. While there were some fairly good cattle passing through the yards, yet the majority were of the ordinary to common varieties. The following quotations obtain in this department: Medium to choice steers, \$9.50@10; good to medium steers, \$8.75@9.50; common to good steers, \$7.25@8.25; choice cows and heifers, \$7@7.75; common to good cows and heifers,

HOGS—Receipts in the hog department extended to about 600. In the face of conditions affecting outside buyers, hogs are finding a fairly good outlet, all things considered. Prices ruled steady to a shade lower, at the following quotations: Prime light, \$15.85@16; prime heavy, \$15.85@16; pigs, \$13.75@15; bulk, \$16.85@16.
SHEEP—There were no receipts in this department for the day, which has afforded an opportunity to clear the yards and to relieve the crowded condition. There is practically no change in the sheep market, except a possible downward tendency, and the supply has been sufficient to meet the demand.
