MIKE GIBBONS TRAINS UNCLE SAM'S FIGHTERS.

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Mike Gibbons, middleweight excellent, is, as a matter of fact, too busy to bother about a little thing like a mere fight between a couple of professional scrappers. That is, Mike is too busy to bother about the mine-run variety of box-fights, for Mike is spending his time these days clubbing a bunch of young huskies into fighting shape at Ft. Dodge, which lies just out of Des Moines, Iowa.

Mike had a chance to take on Harry Greb in an encounter at Pittsburg and was ready to sign articles until conditions were imposed he didn't like, so he requested Eddie Kane, his manager, to call off proceedings and let him keep on teaching the soldiers how to box.

"Why, Mike is so wrapped up in this thing I can hardly get him to talk fight," said Kane recently. "He got out of bed one morning at six o'clock and went out to the camp to watch the soldiers go through their calisthenics. He wanted to see it all and learn it for he is going to introduce a Mike Gibbons system to those fellows. He certainly is getting wonderful results with the work he already has started."

Mike himself talked a little about the job and right crosses he is putting into the hearts of the men. He enthused all over himself, and getting Mike to say a few dozen words is like prying a hard-boiled egg loose from a dime.

The boys in Ft. Dodge are getting the benefit of boxing instruction from a postmaster at the art. It is extremely doubtful if the fight game ever has seen a more accomplished master of the mitt than Mike of St. Paul. He is an adept at feinting with his head. His footwork is a revelation, and he combines with these graces, the knack of being able to drive home a punch with murderous effect. Mike's record doesn't boast of a long line of knockouts, but he has the ability to put the sleep punch over, and sometimes does it. His teaching should be the means of making excellent boxers of many men in the division to which he has been assigned.

Bayonet work has been found to combine the work of the boxer and the bayonet expert. Mike's feinting, his ducking and countering should be a handy thing for these young soldiers to have around.

Fresh Air Good for Face.

"It is a mistaken idea that bundling up to the eyes and covering the face with thick veils protects the skin in the winter. The more the face is exposed to the fresh air the better it will be for the complexion, and there is nothing more invigorating and beneficial than a brisk walk during a snow flurry. Never carry an umbrella when it is snowing. The best kind of water to wash your face in is soft rain water, and as snow is only frozen rain water there is surely no reason why it should be injurious to the skin.

"Do not wash your face before going out into the open air, but if cleansing is necessary, apply cold cream and rub it well into the pores, afterward wiping the face with a soft towel. Cleanse the face with cold cream and a good massage cream at least once a week, and apply a lotion to the face, hands, and lips every night before retiring. The lips are more susceptible to cold and chapping more easily than any other part of the face."

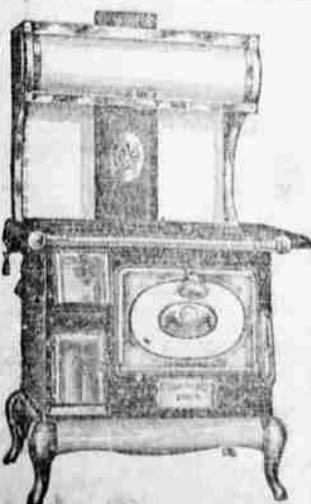
