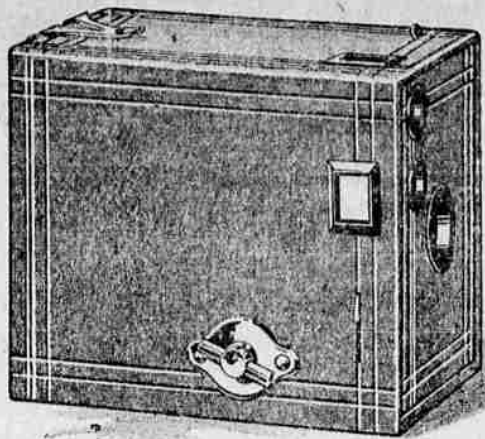

Cow Produces 700 Pounds.

SPOKANE, Wash., Dec. 18.—Eminent Jimps Owl is a four year old Jersey cow weighing about 700 pounds, which has just established an enviable record as a milk producer. The animal is one of the Glen Tana Dairy herd on the Little Spokane river. She came in fresh on May 14 and from that time until November 30, she made a record of 10,431 pounds of milk. At an average of 4 1-2 per cent in making butter and figuring the price of butter at 50 cents per pound, Eminent Jimps Owl can claim a gross output to date of \$254.90. The cow is checked up monthly by an agent of the American Jersey Cattle Club, T. S. Griffith, owner of the herd confidently expects to make a still better record with her. By months the animal's milk production since May 14 reads: May 826.06 pounds, June 1022.01; July 1724.08; August 1711.94; September 1593.01; October 1531.94; November 1410.02.
