To Sell Thrift Stamps—War saving stamps will be sold at all O. W. R. & N. stations.

Christmas Shopping—Christmas shopping is lively in La Grande. There are only a few more days left. Those who can are urged to do their shopping in the mornings.

Open Saturday and Monday Nights—N. K. West Co., the Golden Rule and Hill's Department Stores will be open Saturday night and Monday night during the Christmas season.

Gloria Krause Injured—Gloria Krause, the little daughter of A. N. Krause, sustained a fractured arm Tuesday while playing. Dr. Richardson reduced the fracture.

Interest Paid—Subscribers to the first Liberty Loan are collecting their first six months interest. They clip their coupons, \$1.75 on a \$100 bond, and get the real money or deposit the coupons at the banks.

Asks for Ruling—Faci Administrator Fred J. Holmes, has asked Washington for a ruling as to whether or not to enforce lightless train days and Sundays in Portland where the electricity comes from water power and not from plants using fuel.

Mailing Christmas Gifts—Yesterday saw the actual beginning of the Christmas rush at the La Grande postoffice. All day long lines of persons with arms full of packages for friends and relatives in the East and Middle West were seen in the lobby of the office. The postoffice force was kept on the jump from morning until night.

Charged With Being Shacker—Frederick Thyrsting, who was arrested by Deputy U. S. Marshal Mast, in La Grande, charged with being a shacker, was taken to Baker and arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Woodson L. Patterson. He was bound over to appear before the federal grand jury and was taken to Portland by a deputy U. S. marshal.

May Enlist in Marines—There is a general misunderstanding about enlisting in the marines and navy since December 15. It is still possible for all those registered to enlist in these two branches upon obtaining a certificate of permission from the local draft board. Also the height regulation has been changed from 64 inches up to 74 inches. Enlistments are received to the age of 36 and married men are now accepted in the marines and navy.

Helping Shorten the Shortage—The Oregon Public Service commission

has issued large posters which are being displayed by the O. W. R. & N. calling attention to the ways in which the shipper can help "shorten the shortage" in freight cars. Shippers are advised to load heavily and unload quickly and get the car back into the game again so that others may not suffer through delay. In this manner much will be done to help the railroads take care of the increased business because of the war.

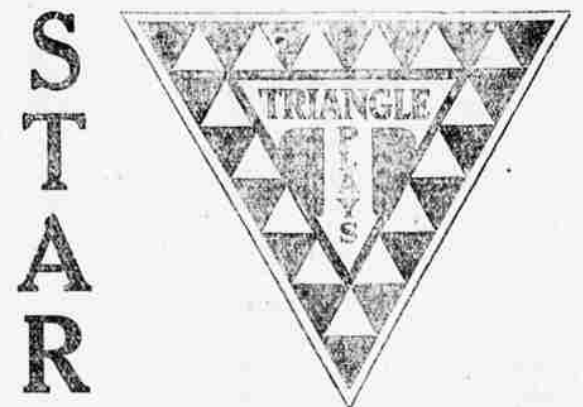
