Arrival of Mail and Observer Great Event at the Front

Almost All the La Grande Hospital Boys Got Letters—
November 22 was Pay Day—Boys Are Paid in French
Money—Boys Are Running a Hospital in Old Castle.
Almost Every Man Insured—Magazines Are Wanted.

Somewhere in France,
November 23, 1917.

Dear Sir:—
The first mail got here day before yesterday just after supper and there certainly was a delighted bunch of fellows. Almost all the fellows got letters and one of the boys had a record of eleven. Yesterday another batch showed up and it was also appreciated by all who received it and also by the others as there were several Observers and they went the rounds so that everybody could enjoy them.

Yesterday was pay day and we received our first pay in French money. It was rather difficult to settle debts between the fellows who had borrowed and those who had loaned money as a dollar is worth five francs and twelve sous.

At last we are running a hospital in an old castle but while we can hear the heavy firing we are a long way from the front and don't expect to be any nearer for quite a while.

So far all the fellows are in fairly good health and almost everyone is gaining weight.

When they call us sanitary troops they name us right as we are have been cleaning up the quarters where we sleep and the rest of the village as well, which I think the people here thought was foolish, cleaning out the dirt that had accumulated for years.

We have about the record on the Government Insurance as almost every man want the limit of ten thousand dollars which was all the insurance that a soldier can take out with the Government. It is a great thing and at very little cost as the average is sixty-five cents a thousand dollars a month which, on a ten thousand

dollar policy would be \$6.50 a month. We have two rooms for a club house, and it certainly is nice as there is nothing much to do and the Y. M. C. A. is mostly crowded and is quite a ways from our quarters. The Y. M. C. A. is sure doing its part in this war and is helping in many ways with its entertainments and entertainers and a place to write letters.

I have one suggestion to make and that is that our auxiliary rather up some of the latest magazines that they have read and send to us for our club rooms as reading matter is getting rather scarce. They would be welcome from any one who has magazines they are through with, though it would be much better to send them through the auxiliary and let them send them as it would save duplicating the same dates. A magazine here is read until it falls to pieces.

There is lots of talk that we will have turkey dinner for Thanksgiving and I hope we do as it will be quite a treat though we have no great kick at our meals since we have gotten used to it.

If you could mail me some notes paper and envelopes some of these times it would be appreciated very much as I can only use one side on account of the censor and the Y. C. is going to keep up with the demand.
