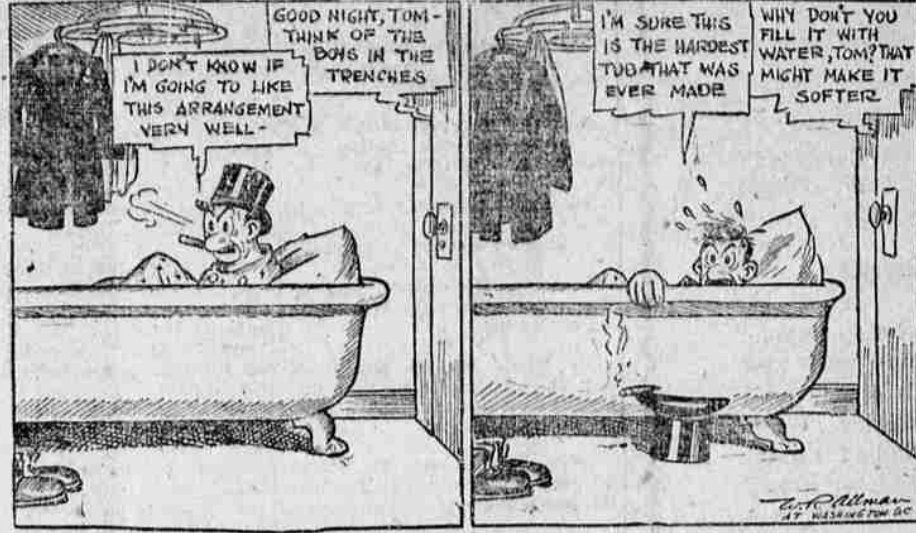

## PORTLAND MARKETS

PORTLAND, Dec. 28.—General trade conditions in the North Portland Yards for the day have been quiet but operations have moved forward on a firm basis. Very light receipts have been offered in the yards and the demand is considerably stronger than the supply. Prices are firm with Monday's prices which showed an advance over the previous week in all departments except the sheep department, and an especially healthful tone in the cattle department.

We quote the following prices:  
CATTLE—Med. to choice steers, 9.75-10.50; good to medium steers, 8.75-9.65; chosen to good steers, 7.25-8.40; choice cows and heifers, 7.00-8.35; common to good cows and heifers, 5.75-7.35; canners, 3.90-5.50; bulls, 4.50-7.00; calves, 7.00-10.00; stockers and feeders, 6.00-8.00.

HOGS—Prime light, 15.35-15.50; prime heavy, 15.45-16.00; pigs, 13.50-14.50; bulk, 15.50.

SHEEP—Western lambs, 13.00-13.50; Valley lambs, 12.50-13.00; yearlings, 12.00-12.50; wethers, 11.75-12.25; ewes, 8.00-10.00.
