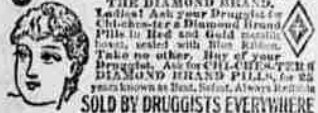

LICENSE TIME EXTENDED.

Whereas the Secretary of State's office has been overwhelmed and can not provide all motor vehicle owners with 1918 license plates, ten days from the date of this notice will be allowed as a temporary, but we insist that motor vehicles display two license plates, one on the front and one on the rear of said vehicle. All motor cars when in operation within Union county, Oregon, shall during the period of one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise display at least two white lights in front and one red light on rear of said vehicle, said rear lamp must show a white light across said rear license plate. All motor bicycles or motorcycles when in operation within Union county, Oregon, shall during the period of one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise display one lighted lamp, such lamp to be placed upon the front of said vehicle and show red light to rear. The above will be strictly enforced within Union county, Oregon, on and after January 12, 1918.

SOLDIERS HAVE GOOD CARE

Uncle Sam is Trying Hard to Get Sanitary Surroundings

CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, Jan. 2.—If some of the folks at home who worry about their boys being in dirty surroundings took only a part of the precautions to prevent dirt accumulating that Uncle Sam uses here, the home towns would close their hospitals.

Uncle Sam wants clean, healthy soldiers as well as trained fighters. From the setting-up exercises in the morning, therefore, there are many numbers on the day's program to promote sanitation and ward disease possibilities.

Besides washing their face and hands, soldiers must scrub behind their ears, must cleanse their teeth daily and must bathe regularly. Mess halls and kitchens must be clean. Fly swatting is a duty for every man observing one of these dangerous pests and policing of company or organization streets prevents any rubbish from accumulating.

A big incinerator erected for such rubbish. Garbage amounting to 25 tons daily is hauled to a distant hillside, and a special contractor carts off all tin cans. A zone extending five miles beyond the cantonment is

\$2,083.13. The budget authorized an expenditure of \$7,500 for labor and material, of which \$1,171 is unexpended. I consider this a good showing in view of the fact that considerable expense was made necessary in order to clean the reservoir and remove obstructions from the pipeline, and also replace the line across the river, which was washed out last winter.

The street department was given a budget appropriation of \$7,000, of which \$1,925 was unexpended. The consolidation of the two department heads, water and street superintendent, has worked out satisfactorily, both as to efficiency and economy.

The fire department has been able to show a saving on its budget account of \$664. This department has maintained its splendid record for efficiency and has kept its equipment up to standard in every way. Of the \$600 budget appropriation for volunteer firemen, we have on hand \$135, making a total saving of \$465 for this department. The department answered 38 calls during the year.

In the engineering department we had a budget appropriation of \$1,200, of which we have unexpended some \$723.

The police department shows that it has used its appropriation of \$2,200. The annual report of the chief of police shows 388 arrests. Twenty-two were discharged on account of insufficient evidence. Traffic violations numbered 151, and 39 arrests were made for the state. The police force consists of two regular men, an occasional extra man, and part of the time a "squad cop."

The combination in force in the recorder's and treasurer's office in

creases the efficiency there and is satisfactory in every way.

The 1917 budget did not provide for any reduction of the warranted indebtedness, but the 1918 budget provides \$6,000 for this purpose; with this provision, the budget for 1918 is \$73,200.
