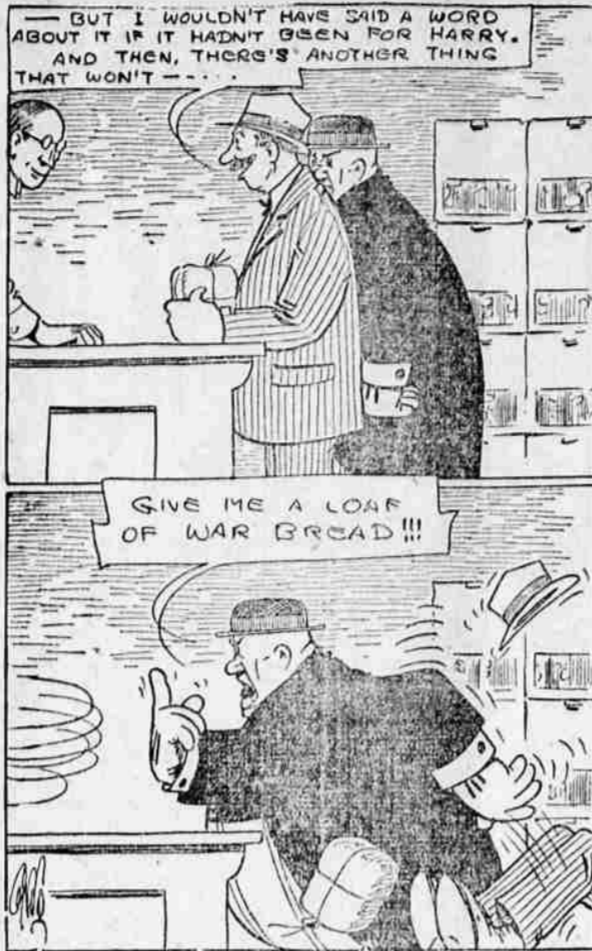

## Of Interest to Women

- Old Fashioned Molasses Candy.**  
2 cupfuls (- pint) molasses.  
1 tablespoonful vinegar.  
2 tablespoonfuls (1 ounce) butter substitute.  
1-2 level teaspoonful baking powder.  
1 teaspoonful vanilla or ginger extract.  
Put molasses, vinegar and butter into a sauce-pan. Bring to a boiling point, and boil, stirring all the time until the mixture is brittle when dropped into a buttered tin. When nearly cold pull until glossy. Cut into small pieces and lay on a buttered plate or wrap in waxed paper. Sufficient for one pound of candy.

### Paul J. Cook Is In Cuba With The Marines

(Letter from Paul J. Cook of the U. S. Marines to William Swart of La Grande.)

Dear Bill:— I received your most welcome letter a long time ago but have neglected to answer as I was very busy breaking camp, but I shall try to make amends, even at this late date. We arrived here October 23 and pitched our shelter tents and slept until morning; by night we had most of our stores unloaded and our tents pitched and in a couple of days we had a galley built and camp made. We get liberty every night from 7:30 to 11. Say Bill, this is some town; about 60,000 population, has 12 Catholic churches, a big hospital, electric lights, street cars, big railroad shops of the Ferro-Carril de Cuba R. R., and more beautiful Sembras to the square inch than any other city to

the square mile. There are thousands of acres of sugar cane and many sugar mills and centrals, one of which we visited since we have been here, a four million dollar concern; they treated us royally out there. Rum is one of the by-products in the manufacture of sugar and millions of gallons are made in Cuba every year; it costs about 30 cents a pint and is sold in the numerous saloons and cafes and even in the grocery stores. There is no such word as "prohibition" in the Cuban dictionary. Coconuts, pineapples, oranges, yams and all the other tropical fruits including bananas, plantains and so forth, grow in great profusion. It is still summer here; just like June and here it is almost Christmas. So your mother misses me and those yarns I used to tell; that is certainly a compliment, and thank her for me for it. I was sorry to hear that Ad Santel threw O'Neill; they weren't fairly matched. Well, Bill, it's almost time for call to quarters so I must close for tonight, wishing you all a very merry

Stefansson in the North. SEATTLE, Jan. 5.—(Special.)—Vilhjalmur Stefansson, the explorer, and the 25 men of his Canadian Arctic expedition have not left the Arctic Ocean, according to reports received here from Dawson, N. T., Fairbanks, Alaska and Ottawa, Canada. An Ottawa dispatch of December 28 said the explorer had left the Northern Seas and had arrived at Fort Yukon in Alaska. Dawson dispatches of December 26 said every member of the party was in good health. According to various reports Stefansson probably will spend this winter in the Arctic and pilot his ships, the Polar Bear and North Star, around Point Barrow and through the Bering Straits to Nome when the ice breaks in the Arctic Ocean next summer.
