### THE MEXICAN EMBASSY IN WAR TIMES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 5.—Mexico has the ultra-modern embassy in Washington. A smoothly working press bureau — supplying Mexican news, works daily in semi-official contact with the ambassador.

Ambassador Ygnacio Bonillas—the Mexican Ambassador, who has an American wife, was a Madero man when the first revolution started in Mexico. He balked at joining the Huerta treason, and was always close to First Chief Carranza. Back in 1884 Bonillas graduated at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology — Previously he had taught public school in Tucson, Arizona.

The ambassador holds many misconceptions of Mexico are due to widespread enemy propaganda circulated throughout the United States. To remedy this evil—the Mexican News Bureau, established in one of Washington's office buildings, makes an effort to provide newsy data on Mexico's attempt to climb back to a state of prosperity—after years of war.
