HIGH SCHOOL TEAM WILL PLAY TONIGHT

The local high school basket ball team is to receive its first real test of the season tonight when it will play the Union high school team in the local school gymnasium at 8:00 o'clock.

Just what the Union team will do in the way of scoring is unknown as they have not been seen in action by the local fans, but it is known that they have been practicing since Thanksgiving and have played several games without a defeat so far.

The local squad is composed en-

tirely of members of the championship football team of last season and the local fans are awaiting this game with a great deal of interest, since it will give them an opportunity to get a line on the men and pass their opinion as to their ability to be able to tuck another championship under their belts this year.

No definite line-up has been decided on by the coach last night, but Captain Ash, McDonald, Garrity, Taylor, Lyman and C. Ash will, in all probability, be selected to represent the nine and white.

The Union team arrived in town on No. 17 this morning and pronounced themselves ready for the fray. J. G. King of the local "Y" will referee.

PORTLAND MARKETS

PORTLAND, Jan. 11.—General market conditions in the Portland Stock Yards continue fair to steady, with the greatest activity shown in the feeder section of the cattle market and the thin lamb section of the sheep market.

The hog market is rather weak, with considerable movement going to outside buyers and a rather sluggish market amongst local buyers. This is influenced somewhat, however, by the fact that the quality offered in the market today is far from being good.

The following prices prevailed in the yards:

CATTLE—Med. to choice steers, 9.75-10.25; good to medium steers, 8.60-9.50; common to good steers, 7.00-8.40; choice cows and heifers, 7.00-7.60; common to good cows and heifers, 5.75-7.00; canners, 3.00-5.25; bulls, 4.50-6.75; calves, 7.00-10.00; stockers and feeders, 6.00-8.00.

HOGS—Prime light, 15.45-15.60; prime heavy, 15.50-15.65; pigs, 12.50-14.50; bulk, 15.50.

SHEEP—Western lambs, 14.50-15.00; Valley lambs, 14.00-14.25; yearlings, 12.50-13.00; wethers, 12.00-12.50; ewes, 5.50-11.00.

Asks Seed Fund Appropriation. WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—(Special.)—David F. Houston, Secretary of Agriculture, has asked Congress for an appropriation of \$5,000,000 to enable the Department of Agriculture to buy and sell seed to farmers for cost at a reasonable price.
