PORTLAND MARKETS
WEEKLY MARKET REVIEW
PORTLAND, Jan. 14.—(Special.)—General conditions for the week in North Portland market have been very satisfactory. The supply has just about balanced the demand, and while the face of the sales have shown a little lower price in some sections than obtained in the previous week, the market quotations should be no lower, quality considered. As a matter of fact, quality considered, the market was probably a little higher. From the buyers' view point the product of this week's 10 cent cattle cost more than the product of the 10.50 cattle of the previous week. Present conditions in the market would indicate and warrant a 11c quotation for actually top finished steers. Common stuff and canners have barely held their own during the week, while the calf market has been very strong and continues to show signs of advance. Conditions in the hog market have shown some signs of weakening as the week advanced, with a decline of possibly 5 to 10c in the trading of the last two days of the week. The general quality of material offered, however, has not been as good this week as during the previous week, and the cuts in prices in the hog market are somewhat like those in the cattle market on account of the quality and a change in quotations would scarcely be warranted on this basis.
Sheep prices have gone sharply upward during the week and the week's close has displayed a valley lamb market extending as high as 14.50, while prime Western lambs would change hands readily at 15.00 to 15.50, and a considerably larger volume could be handled at those prices, than has been offered at any time during the past six weeks.

CATTLE—Med. to choice steers, 9.75-10.25; good to medium steers, 8.60-9.50; common to good steers, 7.00-8.40; choice cows and heifers, 7.00-7.60; common to good cows and heifers, 5.75-7.00; canners, 3.00-5.25; bulls, 4.50-6.75; calves, 7.00-10.00; stockers and feeders, 6.00-8.00.
HOGS—Prime light, 15.45-15.60; prime heavy, 15.50-15.65; pigs, 13.50-14.50; bulk, 15.50.
SHEEP—Western lambs, 14.50-15.00; Valley lambs, 14.00-14.25; yearlings, 12.50-13.00; wethers, 12.00-12.50; ewes, 9.50-11.00.

NEWS AND GOSSIP OF THE WORLD OF SPORTS

SPORTS ARE FLOURISHING AT THE TRAINING CAMPS

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—It required fourteen tracks to handle the 4,000 men taking part in the Liberty Loan track and field meet at Camp Sheridan, Montgomery, Ala., Oct. 4, and athletics in that camp is carried on in just such a manner in other branches.

For instance, Alabama being in the sunny belt, there was baseball all fall. A division championship series was played and 110 teams finished the season. The title was won by the 110th ammunition train. Felt banners were awarded to all regimental championship winners. Baseball has its troubles here, too, according to the division athletic director, for he mentioned to The United Press the fact that several outlaw teams were in the field, aside from the regularly sanctioned league.

Boxing shows are held as a regular part of the camp's athletic work. Joe Mandot, several years ago a famous lightweight, has been assigned to this camp as boxing instructor. A coliseum and a Y. M. C. A. building are used for boxing bouts. The first big boxing show was held the night of Thanksgiving day, with several of the camp's best boxers taking part. Mandot also was on the program for a bout.

Each regiment has a team of cross-country runners. The team selected from the division's athletes finished third in the road race held at Birmingham, Dec. 15.

Football, of course, took up a great deal of time during the fall, Auburn, Alabama university, Chilli-cothe, Camp McClellan, and other teams of reputation paid the camp a visit. The Norwoods of Cincinnati and the Cleveland American league club are among the high-class baseball teams that have been in action at the camp.

Private contributions, the Clark Griffith Hat and Ball Fund, and the Commission on Training Camp Athletes have been good to the camp, and it is well supplied with equipment for athletics.

The camp numbers among its celebrities Lieut. C. C. Childs, a former Yale athlete, who was a member of the last Olympic team.
