FORMER LA GRANDE BOY TO UNDERGO OPERATION

Harold Nutter, Member of D Troop, Is in Hospital at Hoboken, New Jersey

PENDLETON, Jan. 15. (Special.)—Harold B. Nutter, one of the boys who left here last summer as a member of Troop D, is in a hospital in Hoboken, N. J., and was to have been operated on for appendicitis the seventh of this month, according to a letter which has just been received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. B. Nutter of 309 East Court street. After he has sufficiently recovered, he expects to be granted sufficient leave to permit him to come home for a few days and visit. He and his parents formerly lived in La Grande. He says that he is in a Catholic hospital and that the doctors who will operate are skilled professional men and that he has no fear of the result of the operation. He had just had dinner before he wrote and said it was "nice, just like I used to get at home, but not so good."

The young man's letter is filled with inquiries about his friends here, and he is anxious for news and letters from them. The days are long for the boys who have left their homes and especially so for such as he who must spend their time confined away from his fellows.

His brother, Earl L. Nutter, is enlisted in the aviation service and was in training at Houston, Texas, for a time and, in commenting on his brother's enlistment, he says, he realizes the sacrifice that his parents are making, but says: "We are fighting for freedom and right. Some of us are never coming back, but they will be remembered."

Enclosed with the letter was a bit of verse which the lad wrote while in the hospital and which perhaps gives his feelings more truly than does his letter. It follows:

A SOLDIERS' VISION
While lying in bed in a hospital
In old Camp Greene one day,
My thoughts all seemed to wander
Out west to the fields of hay.

I left there to fight for Old Glory
And I joined the troop with the rest,
And now as I view my comrades,
I feel we are doing our best.

We enlisted in Pendleton, Oregon,
And were known as Old Troop D;
But now we are heavy artillery
And soon going over the sea.

To all who are interested in us,
To mothers, sweethearts and wives,
We will be back some day to claim
you;
That is, if we don't lose our lives.

And if such a thing should happen,
Of course, some of us must;
But always remember our motto,
Which is, "In God is our trust."

Our hospital is in North Carolina,
And southern folk all treat us well;
But our memory always lingers
By the farmhouse near the well.

And when this world war is over,
And peace again is restored,
And I can go out west again,
I will ask no better reward.
