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"Church of Gold."

There is no structure just like St. Mark's, in Venice, in the world, notes the Kansas City Journal. Its bulb-shaped domes and minaretlike bell-towers remind the visitor of the Orient. It seems more like a Mohammedan than a Christian temple. In the facade are scores of variously colored marble columns, each one a monolith and all possessing an eventful history. Some are from Ephesus, others from Syria, others from Constantinople and more than one even from Jerusalem. St. Mark's is the treasure house of Venice, a place of pride as well as prayer. The work of beautifying this old church was carried on for five centuries, and each generation tried to outdo all that had preceded it. The walls and roof are so profusely covered with mosaics and precious marbles that it is easy to understand why St. Mark's has been called the "Church of Gold."

Rats Enemies of Birds.

The number of useful insect-eating birds nesting on the ground or in low bushes which fall victims to rats is extremely large and is one of the many kinds of injury done by these pernicious animals which cannot be computed, writes E. W. Nelson in the National Geographic Magazine. Probably few frequenters of the countryside have returned to look into a bird's nest to observe its condition without many times finding it destroyed and fragments of egg shells lying about. Unquestionably a large percentage of such nests located in the neighborhood of buildings have been ruined by rats.

On one of the small Danish islands it has been authentically recorded that the progeny of a single pair of rats, which escaped from captivity, in two years' time exterminated a great colony of birds for which the island had been noted.

Khaki Colors Differ.

Considerable comment is being aroused in official circles and elsewhere over the disparity of the khaki uniforms worn by officers and privates. Some of them are so faded that they look almost white, while others retain original coloring. A few cases have been noted, states the Pathfinder, where the coat and breeches of uniforms have developed different hues.

One excuse offered is that the khaki cloth is acquired from many manufacturers and the grades of it differ widely sometimes. Thousands of young men entering the officers' training camps purchase their own uniforms, and this provides an opportunity for a difference in the quality of the goods.

The Beer of Borneo.

Beer as made by the natives of Sarawak, in the northwestern region of Borneo varies in its ingredients according to the different tribes who make it, the most intoxicating being that made by the Binsulnans of Limbang. These people make their beer by boiling rice, adding yeast, crushed wild chili and a large lump of wood ash. This is all put into a jar till the jar is two-thirds full, and covered over with bamboo supports; water is poured on till the jar is full, and the beer is then ready for drinking. The drinking is performed by pushing bamboo tubes down to the bottom of the jar and then sucking up the liquid. So that no one shall have more than his fair proportion at a time, a system of floats is arranged whereby the amount of drink consumed by each man is registered.

One Tropical Spot.

Only at one place in the United States is there real tropical vegetation, says the Popular Science Monthly. Florida and California have what is called "sub-tropical" vegetation. In the midst of a desert in the extreme southern part of California is a true oasis. The oasis, Palm Springs, lies 250 feet below the sea level. So hot is it there that there is a riot of vegetation all the year round. Enormous fig trees and mammoth grape fruit and oranges are always to be had. The lemons that grow there weigh two and a half pounds apiece. The responsibility for all this may be laid to a beautiful little stream which is fed by the Colorado river and which flows through the oasis only to disappear into the ground at its end.

Did Not Fool the Bear.

Brin is self-educated, but exceptionally wise in the way of mankind. A prospector proved that. Having suffered the loss of much food, he prepared a particularly tasty morsel for the bear and left it in the cabin, with a notice on it to warn any prospectors or hunters that might enter that it was intended for brin, and brin alone. The bear arrived in due course and ate everything edible and some things that were not, but passed up the morsel that had been prepared for him. And it was brin, too. This prospector declares that the bear must be able to read.

FINDS LIVE "GHOST" AT TOMB

Spook Found in Cemetery by Caretaker Proves to Be Soldier, Probably Insane.

Columbus, O.—John Davis, caretaker of Walnut Hill cemetery, Hamilton township, never believed in ghosts, but he did have a "spooky" experience.

Davis was strolling through the cemetery when he happened to see a figure sitting on a tombstone. Close inspection showed it to be a man with only a blanket thrown around his shoulders. His clothes were lying in a heap at his feet.

As Davis approached, the figure arose and inquired if the referer was coming. Davis said he didn't know, but would to him. However, the man intimated that was unnecessary and said he wanted to have a little boxing match.

Davis brought the man to the county jail, where an examination of his clothes brought out enlistment papers for the army. It was decided to hold an inquest for lunacy.

The Humming Bird Flower.

Althea's analysis, the wonderful so-called "humming bird flower" of the plains of eastern Turkey, stands unique and alone among the many specimens of floral nectar that have been classified by modern botanists. It is a beautiful blossom of variegated hues, the total length of the entire flower being about one and three-quarter inches. As one might imagine from its name, it is an exact image of a miniature humming bird. The breast is green, the wings deep rose color, the throat yellow and the head and beak almost pure black. The only particular in which it is not a perfect bird is that the stem gives it the appearance of having but a single leg and foot.

Effects of the Sun.

City dwellers and those who do not lead a constant outdoor life should avoid exposing unshielded portions of their bodies to the bright sunlight for a prolonged period. According to the Journal of the American Medical Association, German specialists who have investigated the subject say that the damage that frequently follows the popular pastime of lying for hours in the sun on the sand at German beaches is not merely sunburn, but headache and often meningitis. Those who are inclined to be nervous are more quickly affected by undue exposure to the rays of the sun, and the unacclimated and nervously predisposed city indoor workers are the very persons who are most fond of sun baths. A tanned and vascular skin offers a better protection against the sun's rays, but the city dweller's skin is neither tanned nor vascular. Instead of being benefited, the nervous are rendered more nervous, and when the summer is over they are tanned, but otherwise in poorer condition than in the spring.

Gold in Montana.

The first discovery of gold in Montana is accredited to a full-blooded Indian, who in 1852 found "colors" in gravel near the mouth of God creek, a small stream that rises in the northeast corner of the Phillipsburg quadrangle, and the first workable placer discovered in Montana was found on

this creek in 1892, recites the Geological Survey Bulletin. A small quantity of gold was taken out of these gravels by means of sluice boxes on the creek near the present site of Pioneer. The deposit afterward explored by the Hope mine was discovered in December, 1894, and in 1895 Phillipsburg was founded just south of the mine. Since that time the Phillipsburg district has produced about \$50,000,000 in gold and silver.

Green.

Owing to its derivation the word "green" was originally applied to the color of vegetation, but not to the color of the sea. No application of "green" to the color of the sea is quoted before Champer, but as early as the year 700 it was used for vegetation. The word is akin to "grass" and "grow," which verb originally belonged to the vegetable world alone. Vegetables "grow," but animals "wax." "Green" comes from an Aryan root, "ghnar," meaning to be green or yellow, and "yellow," "gold" and "yolk" come from that same root.

Cleanliness.

Twice or three now have been reminded that "cleanliness is next to godliness" is from John Wesley and not from the Bible, and every time we vow we will not make the mistake again. So to impress it upon our mind we looked it up in Wesley's works. It occurs in his "Several Conversations," addressed mostly to ministers, which we advise ministers to read. The clause in which is the quotation referred to reads: "Everywhere recommend decency and cleanliness; cleanliness is next to godliness."—Ohio State Journal.

Kiss Under the Mistletoe.

The mistletoe was held in great reverence by the Druids. It was believed to be particularly and divinely healing; in fact, it was given this attribute for centuries. It had special significance as the cause of the death of Balder, the Norse Apollo, who was killed by an arrow made from its branches.

Subsequently Balder was restored to life, the mistletoe tree was placed under the care of Frigg, and from that time until it touched the earth was never again to be an instrument of evil.

The present custom of kissing under the mistletoe is the outcome of an old practice of the Druids. Persons of opposite sexes passed under the suspended vine and gave each other the kiss of love and peace, in full assurance that, though it had caused Balder's death, it had lost all its power of doing harm since his restoration.

Churches in Queer Places.

People at Tunbridge Wells, England, rarely say that it is impossible to be in two places at one time, because if they enter the beautiful old chapel of ease in their town they can stand in two counties and three parishes. This chapel stands partly in Kent and partly in Sussex. This is how the problem is worked out. When the clergy-

man leaves the vestry he comes out of the parish of Frant, in Sussex. If he is going to officiate at the altar he walks into the parish of Tunbridge, in Kent. If, on the other hand, he is going to preach the sermon, he walks from the parish of Frant to the parish of Speldhurst on the way to the pulpit. In half a minute he can enter the two counties and the three parishes named. The members of the congregation, however, have to content themselves by sitting in one county and one parish like ordinary folk.

In the old sepulchers at Thebes, Egypt, butchers are represented as sharpening their knives on a round bar of metal attached to their aprons which from its blue color is supposed to be iron.
