

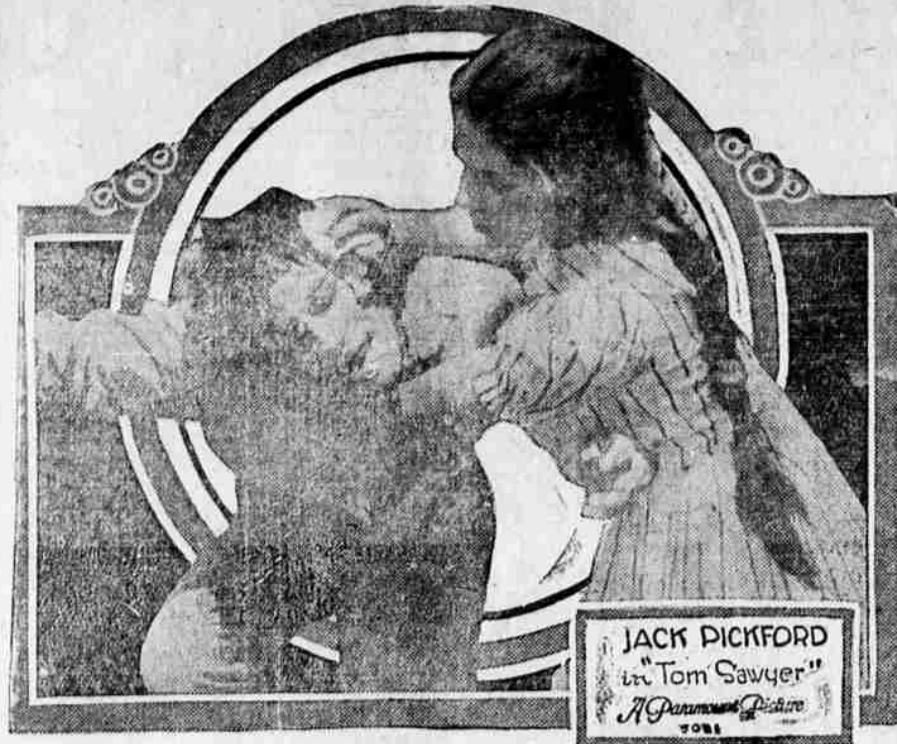

C. C. Bradley, a prominent Portland business man and grand exalted ruler of the Elks, arrived in La Grande today at noon and will attend a special meeting of the lodge tonight.

Years later Lambert, now a confirmed drunkard, returns to his camp. A young girl named Lily befriends the dog when it is injured and wins Lambert's confidence. "Clean-up" Carter and his friend reappear and the former takes a fancy to Lily. The girl is saved from him and Lambert, after recognizing West shoots and kills him. Lambert experiences a return to his former self-respect and also discovers that Lily is his daughter.

The picture as a whole makes a feature of about average strength. William Stowell plays the part of Lambert, Helen Gibson the wife, Betty Schade is Faro Fanny and Hector Dion the gambler.

FRED L. MEYERS TO BE THRIFT MANAGER

Mr. Fred L. Meyers, cashier of the La Grande National Bank, has been appointed chairman of the campaign for the sale of thrift stamps in Union county. The appointment was made by Leon Cohen, of Pendleton, campaign manager for the Second congressional district. C. S. Jackson of Portland, is the state manager. Oregon's quota is \$17,000,000 which are to be sold during 1918. Stamps will have to be sold at the rate of \$55,000 a day in the state in order to reach the quota. Every man, woman and child in the state will have to buy \$20 worth of stamps in order to hold up Oregon's record.
