PORTLAND LIVESTOCK MARKET

PORTLAND, Jan. 21.—General conditions at the Portland Union Stock Yards for the week's opening market have been very favorable to the shipper. The market has shown a splendid strength in both the cattle and hog departments, with a substantial advance in the range of prices.

While the receipts and volume of business in the cattle department were not large, the prices were 25 to 50 cents higher in the different classes, reaching an 11¢ top on steers, and an \$5.50 top on cows. The top steers showed an advance of about 25 to 35 cents while common to medium stuff and cows showed an advance of 35 to 50 c. Buying was very active and before the noon period arrived the entire offering had changed hands and the yards were cleared. Three or four loads of steers sold for 11¢ straight, and an many more sold for 10.65 to 10.75. The great bulk of the steers offered went at 10.90 to 11.00. About six loads of cows sold for \$5.50 and as many more at \$5.00-8.50. The bulk of the cows offered changed hands from \$3.00 to \$5.00. Common to medium stuff showed a sharp advance with about half enough supply to meet the demands of the market. The following quotations are current in the cattle department: Medium to choice steers, 10.35-11.00; good to medium steers, 9.35-10.35; common to good steers, 7.75-9.25; choice cows and heifers, 7.75-8.50; common to good cows and heifers, 6.50-7.75; canners, 3.00-6.00; bulls, 5.00-7.50; calves, 7.50-11.00; stockers and feeders, 6.00-9.00.

The hog market was very active, extending to 16.10 for a top. The bulk of the hogs sold at about 16.00. There were only about two loads of high quality hogs offered on the market today and the secondary stuff got away with 15.75 and up. This makes the market show an advance of 35 to 40¢. The offering was not sufficient in this market to meet the demands. A heavy increase in shipments would be absorbed in this as well as in the cattle department to a good advantage. The quotations are as follows: Prime light, 15.75-16.00; prime heavy, 15.75-16.10; pigs, 15.75-14.50; bulk 15.75-16.00.

The sheep market continues steady with the supply in the yards and local feed lots cut in two just about the middle within the past two weeks. The movement of dressed lamb is considerably more active, which bids fair to an active sheep market in the early Spring. The current quotations are: Western lambs, 14.50-15.00; Valley lambs, 14.00-14.50; yearlings, 12.50-13.00; wethers, 12.00-12.50; ewes, 9.50-10.50.

WEEKLY MARKET REVIEW

PORTLAND, Jan. 19.—While the general run of live stock for the past week has been lighter than the offering of any week recently, the supply in the hog alley was comparatively heavy, amounting to approximately 6000 head, while less than 2000 cattle or sheep came forward. The shortage in supply has been fairly well responded to by activity in upward price tendency.

The market opened the first of the week with a strong tendency showing a sharp increase in the cattle market but the tendency throughout the entire week has been upward in all departments.

While prices continued about the same in the hog department, the quality offered was so much lower that an offering of high quality would have justified a 10 to 15 cent raise in quotations.

The cattle market has been extremely active and the close of the week finds everything selling at the top of the quotations established by a sharp advance on Monday. Everything points to a continued strength in this section of the market and there is no question but that a heavy increase in the supply for the coming week will pass the scales on a strong market. The demand for the week has been about three times the supply.

HOGS—Prime light, 15.45-15.60; prime heavy, 15.50-15.65; pigs, 13.50-14.50; bulk, 15.60.

SHEEP—Western lambs, 14.50-15.00; Valley lambs, 14.00-14.25; yearlings, 12.50-13.00; wethers, 12.00-12.50; ewes, 9.50-10.00.

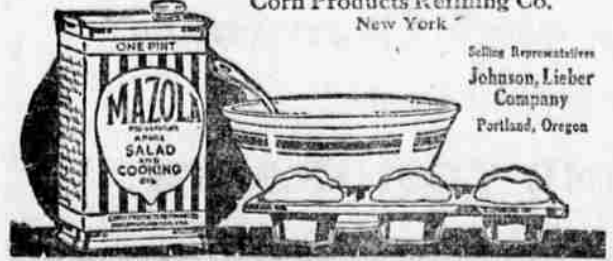
