"THE CLEVER MRS. CARFAX"

Julian Eltinge Is Featured in One  
of His Unique Dual Roles—Sub-  
ject Has Strength and Interest  
Aplenty.

Julian Eltinge in his second screen  
appearance may be said to be even  
more successful than he was in the  
first—and "The Countess Char-  
ming" was a good picture. "The Cle-  
ver Mrs. Carfax" has a clever plot and  
a lot of real interest. This Lasky  
subject was written by Hector Turn-  
bull and Gardner Hunting, the latter

being responsible for the scenario.  
They are deserving of praise for  
their work. It is a rare example of  
a story being written around a cer-  
tain player and being out to fit his  
measure.

The writers have put pep into  
their subtitles. They have taken  
pains to instill in the minds of those  
who see the picture that Mrs. Car-  
fax is feminine only as to garb and  
when in "company" as to manner;  
but among "her" friends the im-  
personator is Temple Trask, a husky  
specimen of healthy masculinity.  
It is in this phase of the picture that  
constitutes one of its strongest  
points. It crops out continually in  
the action as well as in the subtitles.  
And speaking of action, it may be  
said right here that that is fast.

Donald Crisp has directed Mr. El-  
tinge, and with his usual skill. He

has given full effect to the surprises  
in the course of the play, and these  
multiply toward the end. The fea-  
tured player has the role of a success-  
ful newspaper publisher who, when  
he believes friends of his are in dan-  
ger of being swindled, capitalizes his  
experience in college as a female im-  
personator and sets out to dump up  
the crooks. The absence of the  
spoken voice can but add to the illu-  
sion, and surely it requires little  
stretch of the imagination to feel  
that Mrs. Carfax really is fooling the  
public.

Mr. Eltinge has not the advantage  
of the presence in the cast of Tully  
Marshall, who contributed so materi-  
ally to the success of his first sub-  
ject. Jennie Lee is a crabby, rich  
old grandmother, and plays her part  
with the skill of the veteran that  
she is. Noah Beery and Rosita Mar-  
tini acceptably play the heavy roles.  
Daisy Robinson is Helen Scott, the  
granddaughter wrongly accused of  
theft.

"The Clever Mrs. Carfax" should  
go straight anywhere. It has novel-  
ty, and what is better it has drama,  
with a measure of comedy.

Unusually Entertaining Comedy

"The Frame-Up" is an unusually  
entertaining five-part comedy drama  
featuring William Russell. The story  
does not appeal as being an especial-  
ly well-constructed one, but the ac-  
tion is both amusing and thrilling.

As the story runs, the young son  
of a rich man is awakened one morn-  
ing from a dream of a wild drive in  
his racer, which, by the way, is  
amusingly pictured, to a resolution  
to take a vacation from the hard task  
of doing nothing. In the course of  
the day he rescues a young woman,  
the daughter of a taxi-cab owner,  
from an unscrupulous chauffeur and  
is offered a position by the girl's  
mother. In taking this position he  
helps to capture three yeggmen and  
finally marries the girl. One of the  
funniest things in the picture is the  
wild ride taken by the young man's  
father in his son's automobile when  
in rescuing the girl he leaves "pu"  
to run the car himself. The car goes  
on a mad rampage until it runs out  
of gasoline and has to be towed  
home. This number can be present-  
ed before any audience with an as-  
surance that it will please.
