THOSE REJECTED FOR FIRST CALL TO BE RE-EXAMINED

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 29.—(Special.)—Major-General William C. Gorgas, in an address before the

American Academy of Political and Social Science last night said draft regulations are now being revised so that thousands of men who failed to pass the physical examination in the last draft would be eligible in the next call. More than 200,000 men, he said, were rejected because of minor physical defects, easily corrected by slight surgical operations.

General Gorgas said present plans call for from 12 to 15 hospitals in France to care for reconstruction cases of the American expeditionary forces. The allies, the speaker said, have sent back 85 per cent of their wounded to the trenches. Only 10 per cent were permanently disabled. Of the Canadian overseas forces he said but 10 per cent had been evacuated home.

Goethals O Ka Deal

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29. (Special.)—Major-General Goethals, acting quartermaster-general, after personal investigation, has endorsed the action of Charles Eisenman, chairman of the supplies committee of the Council of National Defense.

Mr. Eisenman negotiated the Army cloth scrap-sorting contract with the Dams Sorting Company of New York, which has been so vigorously criticized in the Senate military committee's war inquiry.

"I DON'T CARE," IS SUSPECT'S CREED.

Half Million in France

PORTLAND, Jan. 29.—(Special.)—With the Stars and Stripes draped across her bow and stern, the Union Jack flying above her main platform, and the voices of 1500 spectators and all the whistles on the river shouting a defiance to the Kaiser and his agents, the Westrate, an 8500-ton steel vessel, slid serenely down the ways at the Columbia River Shipbuilding Corporation's plant at noon yesterday and came to rest in the channels, riding gracefully at the end of her anchor chain.

To Mrs. W. B. Beebe, wife of the vice-president of the Northwest Steel Company, was given the honor of breaking the bottle, wrapped in red, white and blue silk ribbons, against the vessel's bow. All spectators of the launching, who were admitted by invitation only, also were tagged with ribbons of the National colors.
