Nitrate of soda is not used in Union county as a fertilizer at the present time because our soils are comparatively rich and ordinary barnyard manure and the plowing under of red clover, sweet clover or alfalfa is a much cheaper source of nitrogen, says Paul H. Spillman, the County Agricultural Agent.

Storm Ties Up Traffic—PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 29—(Special.)—Due to the biggest snow storm of the winter, the tie-up on the Pennsylvania is said by railroad officials to be the worst in years. Outbound service from Philadelphia has practically been annulled. Six of the Pennsylvania's fast through trains were stalled in the mountains. Four are indefinitely tied up at Altoona.
