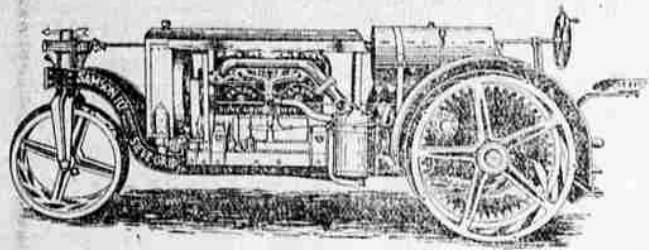

Tractor vs. Man-Power

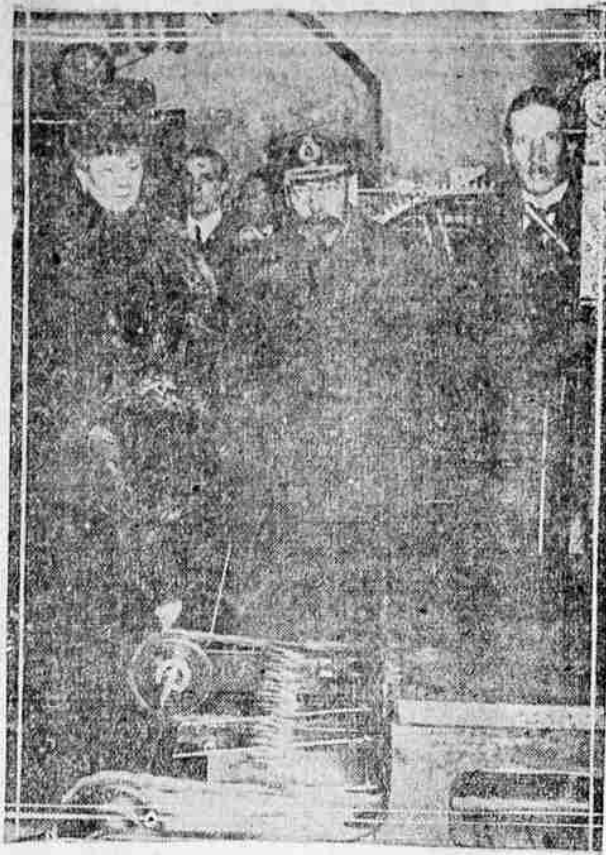

THRIFT CAMPAIGN IN UNION COUNTY

(Continued From Page 1.) tails of the organ; Jan which is to last for a year. Educational propaganda, spread of the value theory of thrift and frugality, the detailed outline of how the stamps are to be placed on sale everywhere and how sales stations check in and out on the stamps, was thoroughly explained.

So far as the county is concerned, F. L. Meyers is the chairman, but captains and lieutenants will be put in charge of subdivided geographical districts by the county committee. The industrial centers will be dealt with through W. H. Taylor, foreman of the La Grande shop; W. H. Bahnsen is chairman of the commercial interests; H. E. Dixon is assumed the post of interesting fraternal institutions in thrift and will be secretary of the executive committee; Mrs. A. E. Lathrop, who was out of town, however, yesterday, in charge of the educational activities; E. E. Braug has charge of the postoffice meter; while the office detail and executive routine will be

transacted from the office of F. H. Currey, city manager. Under Mr. Currey's jurisdiction comes the distribution of exploitation and newspaper publicity. A. W. Nelson, A. C. Hampton, Clarke Lelter and the county weekly editors of the county comprise the county's publicity team. These chairmen constitute, with the county chairmen, the executive committee of the county. With the exception of Chairman Meyers and Mrs. Lathrop, who were out of town, all chairmen were present at the meeting yesterday.

So minutely will these campaigns of education, aiming towards "war consciousness" be conducted, that when the actual campaign to "put over" the sales comes, thrift stamps will be so thoroughly understood as to leave no one in ignorance. "Two-bit" clubs, chain letters, thrift clubs in organizations and church institutions, thrift stamps everywhere—to teach and impress upon the public of Union county the great need of saving pennies—all these sterling truths will be the first duties before the committees. After that comes the routine matter of actually gloaming the cash and turning the stamps out on the public. A veritable flood of literature and appeals to save will be poured over Union County—and

by like organizations elsewhere, over the whole United States. When this closely-knit and far-reaching institution has fulfilled its mission it will have taught Americans the importance of thrift, or else failed in its mission. Union county's quota, based on \$20.00 per capita ratio, is about \$350,000.
