**Court Holds Man Not Fit Guardian for His Child.**  
F. Buell Adams of Oklahoma City, Okla., has discovered that the law does not look upon a man who begins courting three months after his wife dies and marries a month later as a fit guardian for a minor child. The mother of the first Mrs. Adams asked for a writ of habeas corpus for the possession of their little boy, whom Adams held.

When the case came up the court asserted that any man who had no tender memories for a true and faithful wife was not a fit guardian for a child. He awarded the little one, a boy, to his grandmother.

**Special Notice to the Relatives of Soldiers and Sailors**  
The Bureau of Military and Naval Insurance announces that only about one-fifth of the enlisted men have as yet applied for insurance.

If a man has been enlisted before October 15, 1917, he has until Feb. 12, 1918, only to make application. If he enlisted after October 15, 1917, he has 120 days during which he may make such application.

Special provision has been made for the families of men entitled to insurance to fill out special blanks which may be sent to the enlisted men for their signatures. Dr. W. D. McMillan has a large supply of blanks for this purpose and if any relative of an enlisted man desires to avail themselves of their right to war insurance they may obtain these blanks and send them to the boys AT ONCE. If you know of any enlisted man who has not made application for war risk insurance, get a blank, fill it out and send it to him before February 12. d1-31-44. wk2-8-11.
