A Christmas story filled with genuine Christmas sentiment at the beginning and leading up to a strong series of emotion situations—such as "Beloved Jim." It goes a step further than the usual Yuletide narrative, several steps, in fact, in that it combines a real story with the customary holiday atmosphere.

And Jim's heart problem is not an obvious one, for the observer is kept wondering until the very close whether sorrow or happiness is to be his final lot.

Harry Carter makes his first appearance since "The Gray Ghost" in the title role, which he handles with pleasing skill. Priscilla Dean, who had the feminine lead in "The Gray Ghost," plays the part of the orphan girl, Mary, around whose past the story centers.
