On War Rations.

(United Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The food administration has ordered all hotels, restaurants and dining cars to run on reduced bread rations. The instructions issued specify that no more than two ounces of bread or rolls be served as one portion. In the case of corn, oatmeal or bran bread, they can serve four ounces.

PORTLAND MARKETS

PORTLAND, Feb. 5.—The receipts at the Portland Union Stock Yards for the week's opening market were heavier than they have been for some weeks past, and generally speaking, the run, both of cattle and of hogs, was of a better quality than has been shown in recent weeks. Elvea cents was a very common expression on the steer market today and a great many of the steers offered got away at that price, while 10c was the top end of the cow price and all medium to common stuff showed an increase in strength of 25 to 50 cents. One load of good "warm feeders" crossed the scales this week at 10 cents, which is the top for the season in that class of animal. The general tone of the cattle market continues to show strong upward tendencies. While the buyers showed a determined effort to avoid a further increase in price yesterday, they were liberal enough in their classification so that the whole cattle market really exhibited additional strength as compared with the previous week's operations. The conditions obtaining should encourage the westward shipment of Eastern Oregon and Idaho live stock. There has never been a time when the margin between this market and Missouri River points was so encouraging to the Coast market.

The hog market showed an extraordinarily strong tone, getting away at a 16.50 top, and a general advance of 10 to 15c along the line, excepting pigs, which just about held steady at 13.75 to 15.00. The great bulk of the hogs offered on the market yesterday were sold to out-of-town buyers. Local buyers appeared on the hog market at the bare end, but they went away empty handed, getting across the scales with practically nothing but contract and drive-in stuff while outside buyers took practically all of the open market offerings at the prices quoted above.

The following range of prices are quoted in the different departments of the market: CATTLE—Med. to choice steers, 10.55-11.00; good to medium steers, 9.35-10.35; common to good steers, 7.75-9.25; choice cows and heifers, 8.00-10.00; common to good cows and heifers, 6.50-8.00; canners, 4.00-6.00; bulls, 5.00-7.50; calves, 7.50-11.00; stockers and feeders, 6.00-9.50.

HOGS—Prime light, 16.20-16.35; prime heavy, 14.35-16.50; pigs, 13.75-15.00; bulk, 16.35.

SHEEP—Western lambs, 15.00-15.50; Valley lambs, 14.50-15.00; yearlings, 13.00-13.50; wethers, 12.50-13.00; ewes, 9.00-11.00.
